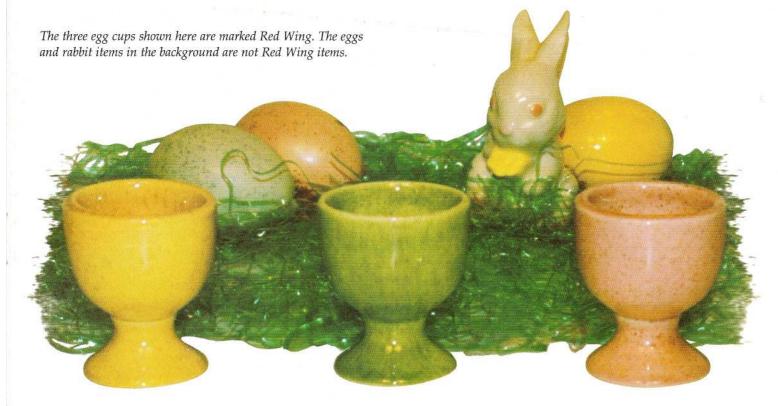
THE ELUSIVE EGG CUPS

There is not much information available on the eggs cups pictured here. Below you will find a photo of three 2¼" egg cups in Ray Reiss' "Red Wing Art Pottery Two including pottery made for RumRill." Some eggs cups were marked Red Wing and some were not. The photo on the right is of an unmarked egg cup. The eggs cups were not included in any known

catalog. The Reed pattern had egg cups, which were marked Red Wing, and have the characteristic Reed ridges.

It is speculated that the egg cups in the photo below may be the same vintage as the Bob White line because the glazes have the same speckles as Bob White and Round Up.

COLLECTING RED WING STONEWARE COMMUNITY EDUCATION CLASS

There are many ways to share your Red Wing collection with other people; sharing stories, displaying your collection in your home, belonging to one of the state Chapters, selling some pieces or teaching a class. Teaching a class? It is not as intimidating as it sounds. Many cities across the country offer Community Education classes where people who don't necessarily teach for a living share their skills, talents and passions with others. These kinds of classes offer a relaxed, fun atmosphere that allows people to learn more about a specific topic in a short period of time.

The city of Red Wing offers a diverse array of classes in the Community Education department. On February 26th, Dave and Diane Hallstrom and Larry Peterson taught a Community Ed class on collecting Red Wing stoneware. Teach a class on Red Wing stoneware in Red Wing?

Absolutely. There are many people who live in Red Wing and the surrounding communities that are vaguely familiar with the Red Wing Potteries but do not understand the history or value behind it. The city has also continued to grow and the new residents may not be aware of the significance the Red Wing Potteries.

The Community Ed classes are similar to the educational groups that are held during Convention and MidWinter. Dave, Diane and Larry all partnered to share their knowledge with a class that was

held at the RWCS Foundation Museum. The participants had a chance to learn about the Red Wing Potteries in the actual building where it all started plus have a chance to see an up close view of the items on display in the museum.

This is also a great way to share your knowledge and introduce people to the Red Wing Collectors Society. We all have a stake in ensuring that the Red Wing Collectors Society continues into the future and new members are a key component to making that happen.

Go ahead and check with your Community Education department to find out how you can teach a class on Red Wing. You may find that you will meet some new people and have a chance to talk about your interest in the Red Wing Potteries and collection! Here is a brief summary of the topics and information shared in the class.

Collecting Red Wing Stoneware was the first in the series of classes that will be offered on the history of products made by the stoneware companies of Red Wing, Minnesota. There was an in-depth look at the earliest pieces of utilitarian stoneware through the later years of art pottery and dinnerware. The goal was to offer an educational and entertaining class to gain knowledge and values of a national collectable. They toured the museum, had identification and show and tell time, plus answered questions.

This class focused on the Stoneware

products. The other classes focused on Art Pottery and Dinnerware.

Dave and Diane Hallstrom, lifelong Red Wing residents, have been collecting Red Wing pottery and stoneware for over 20 years. They have been actively involved with the Red Wing Collectors Society presenting seminars, displays, and previously chairing the annual Convention for 8 years. They are presently on the board of the Red Wing Collectors Society Foundation, and volunteer their time at the Red Wing Pottery Museum.

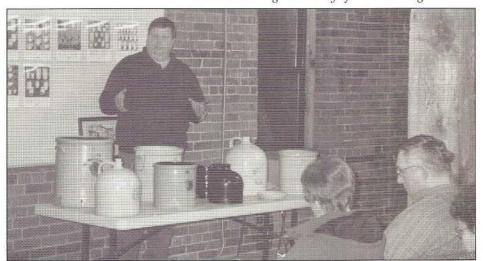
Larry Peterson is a charter member of the Red Wing Collectors Society and co-author of two Red Wing books. Owner of Larry's Jugs in Red Wing, which is an antique shop dedicated to Red Wing Stoneware and pottery. He has been actively involved with the Red Wing Collectors Society presenting seminars, displays, and previously chairing the education committee for 8 years. He is presently on the board of the Red Wing Collectors Society Foundation, and volunteers his time at the Red Wing Pottery Museum.

The class format followed a chronological sequence, beginning with the history of the Red Wing Pottery; The Red Wing Stoneware Company, Minnesota Stoneware, North Star Stoneware, Union Stoneware, Red Wing Union Stoneware and eventually ending with the Red Wing Pottery.

An explanation of the clay in the surrounding areas detailed what made the natural resource so valuable. Then examples were used to show the different types of glazes used and the variety of markings and decorations that make some pieces today highly collectible. The museum had many of the different product lines displayed, which added to the information presented.

Of course the class wouldn't be complete without addressing the lunch hour pieces and why Red Wing is still very collectible and the value appreciates every year. The class attendees also learned about the Red Wing Collectors Society and the Red Wing Collectors Society Foundation Museum.

THE REAL AND THE UNREAL

Ever have one of those moments where you really want to believe what you own or are about to purchase is really an authentic piece of Red Wing? It has happened to the most seasoned collector at one time or another.

Mary Bang, a member of the Gopher Chapter, presented the keynote presentation at MidWinter GetTogether. She had a unique way of sharing the presentation with the other members of her Chapter, and they made the presentation interesting and entertaining. Mary called it "True Confessions."

There were several different areas Mary covered- ceramic hobby, deliberate fakes, respectful replicas, look alikes and genuine Red Wing embellished.

One of the keys to knowing whether your item is authentic is to look at the date and any markings that there are on the piece. The Red Wing Potteries closed in 1967. By looking at the date, you could save yourself a lot of time and frustration. There are many instances where old Red Wing molds were sold and re-used, and

the name Red Wing was never scraped off the mold. Mary showed an example of a mug that was embossed Red Wing USA but had a date of 1980. Compare the item with another of the same type to see if the size is the same. It has been shown that some molds were made

replica slightly different in size. Some pieces are so well done that you really wish they were Red Wing items. Examples shown were dinnerware pieces, a small brown pitcher and a Louisville pottery cruet. Rick Allen had samples of the swans with the baby, which he is not sure they are real. saucer that she bought at her neighbor's garage sale. She passed the piece around the audience so people could see the poor glaze and paint job that was on the piece. There was a donkey basket that looked real but once you compared it to the authentic one, it was easy to spot the fake. Another example was the art pottery snail; one was real and the other had eyes that were different and no bottom marking on it.

Commemoratives are also items that should be looked at carefully.

The ashtray produced by Red Wing Pottery for The Old Mill restaurant in Austin, Minnesota is just one example of the advertising pieces that were produced by the Red Wing Pottery. The Old Mill restaurant remains in operation in Austin.

The Old Mill ordered the ashtrays in the early to mid 1950s. The ashtrays were reported to have been produced in fleck pink, fleck blue, fleck yellow and fleck green.

A large giraffe for sale in a shop was very well done and priced accordingly. It was marked Red Wing but also had a signature of "Nancy-1975." A dead give-away. Mary encouraged people to ask questions if you are not sure. Many sellers are uninformed and would appreciate being told if the piece they are selling is not authentic and why. Some dealers just do not care. You need to look out for yourself. Other examples of respectful replicas were a set of birch bark canoes, which were a Puget Sound replica.

A sample of an embellished piece of Red Wing belonged to Larry Roschen. He had a small pitcher that really was a Red Wing. Someone had taken the original and decided that it would look better with metallic gold painted highlights on it. He also had a pair of shakers that were different sizes

and had different holes in the tops. The shaker colors were true Red Wing colors and he was not sure if they were lunch hour pieces or not. His suspicion is that they are hobby pieces.

A Town & Country teapot was sold on Ebay and purchased on the premise it was a true Red Wing. Once the teapot arrived to it's new owner, he discovered that it was painted under the glaze, not over like true Red Wing style. Red Wing did not mark the Town & Country pieces so if you see one marked, it is a hobby shop piece.

A rare lion was purchased at a Show & Sale and discovered it was not authentic. This was an example of really wishing the lion was a true Red Wing. Mistakes can be very costly at times to collectors, so try to educate yourself as best you can!

The Red Wing Collectors Society continues to be on the cutting edge of one of the most important movements in the collecting industry. As we continue to expand and look for new and creative ways to get young people involved, we are asking our members for their ideas, suggestions and support. The KidsView seminars are once again going to be a highlight of the July 2003 Convention.

There are several interactive events in the works for KidsView 2003 that will get the whole family excited and involved. Returning, by popular demand, is Plate Painting, Clay Modeling, KidsOnly Auction, and Decorating a Special Pottery Piece.

All kids registered for Convention can take part in the seminars and activities. We plan on having educational seminars about Red Wing Dinnerware, Art Pottery, Stoneware and Advertising Pieces and Commemoratives. We will continue to have several activities at every session that will relate to all age groups.

Don't leave the kids behind. They want to learn about Red Wing pottery, too! In order to encourage families to participate in all Red Wing events, kids who attend the KidView seminars will receive a free voucher to attend the barbecue/picnic Friday evening. There will be an opportunity for parents to leave their child(ren) for supervised activities during the first two hours of the auction. The number of volunteers to provide supervision will limit participation in this event.

An important element of the KidsView seminars is the unbelievable support from members. Last year there were over 100 kids at the KidsOnly Auction. CHARTER MEMBER HAS NEVER MISSED A CONVENTION

There are many die-hard Red Wing members across the country who love their Red Wing pottery. Can you imagine being at every single Convention since the beginning? We had the honor of meeting Katheryn (Kay) Schroeder at MidWinter. Kay is Charter Member #36 and we visited with her and asked her to share her thoughts on how the Red Wing Collectors Society has changed since that day in 1977 when she attended the first gathering.

Kay and her husband John saw an ad in the "Antique Trader" magazine about a gathering of people who had an interest in Red Wing Pottery items. Kay called Dave Newkirk and asked him about the \$6.00 registration fee, what it covered and what was the refund policy. Kay and John had some Red Wing stoneware pieces and crocks and they were familiar with Red Wing, being from McFarland, Wisconsin. So they traveled to Red Wing, Minnesota that summer afternoon with a big blanket and a picnic lunch to meet with the other Red Wing enthusiasts. Kay couldn't believe that some people were even selling pieces. They attended the banquet at the St. James that evening and had to stay at a hotel in Ellsworth, as there were no rooms available in Red Wing.

Kay has attended the Convention every year since and they regularly sold pieces at the Convention Auction or Show & Sale. She also plans to go on the RWCS Cruise next November if everything goes as planned.

When asked what she thought about the RWCS today, she remarked that there have been some growing pains but that is common when an organization gets as large as the Society is today. The Convention and MidWinter's are not as intimate as they were in the beginning but also the facilities have grown to accommodate the larger membership. She believes the RWCS is on the right track and it helped when the organization became a non-profit group.

"It is amazing that the Red Wing Collectors Society has kept growing all these years. We need to continue to reach out to all new collecting members and focus on the kids. They are the future of the Society. Belonging and collecting together can pull families together, which is fabulous!" said Kay.

The panel of speakers who were part of the 25th Anniversary Convention last year were very interesting to Kay. She enjoyed hearing from the people who were

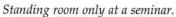
The weekend was filled with learning, buying, selling and visiting with collector friends.

For those of you who have not been able to stop by the Red Wing Collectors Society Museum lately, we wanted to share with you some exciting news. The displays have been updated again to include different pieces the visitors can learn about and enjoy. Through the Museum windows, a roll top office desk and wood-burning stove are surrounded by an extraordinary donation of Red Wing jars from 4 to 25 gallons. Also the Board has begun work on the new addition to the Museum. In the new room, there will be a display area where Red Wing Chapters will be invited to create displays of Red Wing Stoneware, Art Pottery, and Dinnerware.

Also new on loan to the Museum is a fine display of Hamm's Beer promotional bears and the buffet set, including two of the rare dinner plates (pictured here). The Hamm's buffet set came in a box marked "Sky Blue Water Buffet Set". Forest Richardson, President of Red Wing Potteries from October 1955 until in 1957, produced a brochure* that was enclosed with the Hamm's set. Here is the text of that brochure:

"We at the Red Wing Pottery have been commissioned by the Hamm's Brewing Company to design a set of pottery that would not only depict a refreshing outdoor theme of the 'Land of Sky Blue Waters,' but also provide a serviceable barbeque-buffet set that would complement the name that it carries as well as be a tribute to the workmanship here at Red Wing, of which we are so proud."

"All of these pieces are decorated individually by hand. We are the largest hand decorating pottery in the United States and we pride ourselves on our workmanship. We are especially proud of this line of pottery ware. So much, so in fact we are currently conducting tests to determine whether or not we can introduce this on a national scale. If these tests prove out, you will see this pottery on the shelves of the finest stores throughout the country."

"We hope you are as proud of this pottery as we are, and based on our eighty years' experience in this business, we are sure that you will get many hours of enjoyment from it."

Also to help the Museum as it continues to develop, Wally Armstrong, Representative At Large for the RWCS, has started a memorial fund. In loving memory of his wife, Wally created the Jesse Armstrong Memorial Fund for the

Foundation. With nearly \$1000 already donated in her memory, the Board is using these early donations to complete the front for the new display room. Donations to the Jesse Armstrong Memorial Fund can be sent to RWCS Foundation, 317 Bush Street, Red Wing, MN 55066.

As you might know, all Red Wing Collectors Society members are members of the Foundation. The nine-member Foundation Board has three open seats each fall.

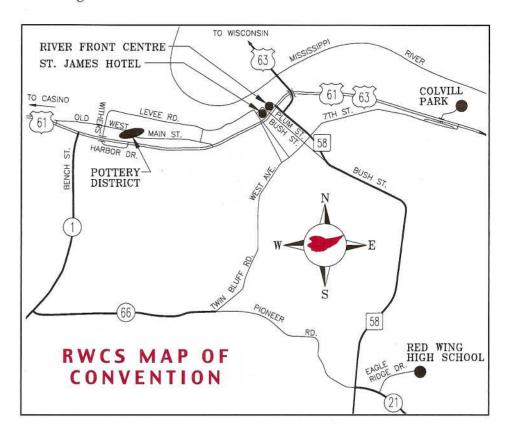

He would rise early, write approximately 700 words, and then spend the rest of the day fishing, relaxing and drinking in his favorite pub five blocks away.

To our surprise, a bronze beverage server from the Red Wing Concord Line was sitting on the top shelf of the bookcase. It did not have a cover, so it could have been used with almost any of the patterns in the Concord Line. As the Concord Line dates after the Hemmingway's departure, it was probably left by his family.

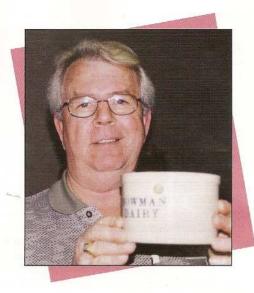
