### ${\mathcal A}$ CLOSER LOOK AT DAVID HALLUM



The beginning of the Red Wing Potteries had several twists and turns, with industrious people working to establish a successful pottery industry in Red Wing, Minnesota. The following information sheds some light on key individuals who influenced this industry in Red Wing.

In 1861, a German immigrant named John Paul arrived in Goodhue Township. The 42 year old newcomer, a potter by trade, had discovered that the North Central section of the township contained the kind of clay needed for his work. For \$7.50 he bought an old schoolhouse and converted it into a small pottery selling most of the items to neighbors. Several years later Paul moved his family to Shakopee. In September 1881, Red Wing Stoneware Company bought the tax-delinquent Paul property for \$4.22.

William M. Philleo also saw promise in making earthenware and in the late 1830's built a manufacturing plant in his hometown of Red Wing. He used coarse clay, likely from the Trout Brook area not far from his West Main pottery, to turn out unglazed terra-cotta products. After losing the first building to fire, Philleo tried to rekindle his pottery idea by starting a new terra-cotta company in St. Paul, Minnesota.

David Hallum, an associate of Philleo, opened his own pottery on Red Wing's Third Street, operating a backyard kiln. Hallum, Henry Mitchell and L. Bowman went into business together in Hallum's back

# 25th anniversary convention poster

The special poster commissioned by the 25th Anniversary Committee for the RWCS Convention made quite a stir at its unveiling in Des Moines during the MidWinter GetTogether! This poster was created by Red Wing local artist Joyce Anderson. The original poster is in watercolor and depicts many of the wares produced by Red Wing, as well as many of the familiar Red Wing landmarks (see photo below). Copies of this poster, as well as note cards and postcards, will be available for sale. There will be 500 numbered prints.

The first hundred of these prints will go on sale Monday, July 8th at the RWCS Foundation Museum during the Charter Member Reception. Joyce Anderson will be in attendance and will be signing posters for a signing honorarium.

Sales will continue Thursday, July 11th in the RWCS Convention Display Room at the Red Wing High School. Posters will sell for \$30.00 a piece. Postcards in packages of 20 and note cards in packages of 15 will both sell for

### Iowa advertising AND ART HOLLIDAY

Art Holliday was the speaker during the MidWinter GetTogether in Des Moines. He shared some of his extensive collection of pieces with attendees and highlights a couple of his favorite pieces for us here.

These are two of approximately 25 advertising pieces discussed during the general session. The Mennig & Slater company is well known to have used many stoneware items for the use of their vinegar and condiments. These items were made by companies such as Red Wing Stoneware, Western Stoneware, and Fort Dodge Stoneware. They were in business as Mennig & Slater from approximately 1884 to 1920.

The photo below shows two of Art's favorite stoneware pieces with this kind of advertising. Des Moines pieces are some of his favorite, as he has lived there most

of his life. The elephant ear 2 gallon churn is molded, and is one of three that is known to exist. Art was the Iowa Chapter Commemorative Chair in 1994, and this churn was used as an example for the second annual Iowa Chapter commemorative. Art did not own the piece at that time, but obtained it just before delivery of the Iowa Chapter commemorative.

Acquiring the piece at that time could not have been better, as they had an original to look at when distributing the commemoratives.

The hand turned two-gallon birch leaf churn is one of two that is known to exist with the large Mennig & Slater oval. Art obtained it in late 1997 from a local antique dealer.

There is a ten gallon open crock with a 10, birch leaves and Union oval on one side that is also unique. On the opposite side,

> there is a relatively small advertising shield only. This is the largest crock he has seen with this type of advertising. Art is aware of one, two, three and eight gallon crocks with this mark. None of these were marked with leaves, but some did have Red Wing numbers. Open crocks with Iowa advertising are hard to find so this piece rated high with Art as a collector.

## ${\mathcal B}$ rush up on red wing pottery

The Red Wing Collectors Society had an incredible opportunity to work with the Minnesota Historical Society in St. Paul during the month of March. There were two different seminars offered to the public and the members of the Minnesota Historical Society.

Ron Linde was the "Guest in the Gallery" on Sunday, March 17th. Ron's topic was Wing Tips, The Story of Red Wing Pottery. He presented some of his personal collection of Red Wing items and did a slide show of the Red Wing Potteries most memorable pieces. The images in the slide show were provided by Larry's Jugs. Ron's educational talk consisted of an overview of the production of stoneware, artware and dinnerware. The Minnesota Historical Society also had several Red Wing Pottery items on display. The "Guest in the Gallery" talks were in half-hour segments and were at 1, 2, and 3 pm. The visitors were encouraged to bring their own pieces of pottery to be identified by Ron. There were approximately 75 people who attended the gallery presentations.

On March 17th and 24th the Historical HiJinx was Brush Up on Red Wing Pottery from 1 to 4 pm. Participants viewed examples of

Red Wing Pottery items from the RWCS collection. A special activity patterned after the KidsView Seminars was the painting of designs on glazed ceramic saucers or platters. Participants could experience what the designers at the Red Wing Potteries may have done when designing dinnerware pieces. They had 219 painters the first weekend and 200 the second weekend of the event! Larry Roschen, Marcia Hislop and Terry Johns did a great job of talking with people and answering questions about the Red Wing items on display. The History HiJinx is a drop-in activity with all the material provided and children of all ages were invited to attend.

The two seminars were an outstanding way to educate the public in a fun and interesting way what the Red Wing Collectors Society is all about and perhaps spark an interest in younger people to want to begin collecting Red Wing for themselves. The Minnesota Historical Society did a great job publicizing the Red Wing events in press releases and their own newsletter that is sent to 17,000 households. We hope that there are other ways to partner with them in the future.

## ${\mathcal A}$ visit with joyce anderson

We had the pleasure of talking with Joyce Anderson, a Red Wing woman who worked at the Red Wing Pottery Salesroom from 1971 to 1981. Joyce has shared her experiences with other RWCS members in the Special Interest Groups during past Conventions. She is also a Charter Member.

It was quite by accident that Joyce learned about the gathering of Red Wing collectors. She had read in the paper about people getting together at the Goodhue County Historical Society Museum to share their interest in Red Wing Pottery items. Joyce visited the Historical Society on her lunch hour and browsed through the pieces people had displayed. On the back porch of the Historical Society, Dave Newkirk was selling his newsletters for 25 cents each. For the small price of \$2.00 Joyce joined the Red Wing Collectors Society and would then get the newsletters for free. She returned to work at the Pottery Salesroom and missed out on the first dinner that night.

The next year Joyce went to the American Legion where Jewell Peterson was selling the commemoratives. Joyce bought the crock but not the mini jug. The mini crock that Joyce has wasn't stamped, so it is a one-of-a-kind. That was how Joyce began her long association with the RWCS.

During her years at the Pottery Salesroom, Joyce really enjoyed selling dinnerware. She liked talking to people and helping them decide on the right pattern and kind of dinnerware for their needs. She fondly recalls how the Pottery Salesroom was always filled with interesting Red Wing pieces.

Joyce also has a special crock. Back in 1955, Joyce's mother Inga Severson bought an older home on East 4th Street in Red Wing. The previous owners had left a crock in the basement and the next year when Joyce was going to make pickles, her mother gave her the old crock to use. Joyce soon discovered that the crock was not very good for making pickles because the juice leaked out, so she just kept it. Over the years she put plants in it and used it as a decoration in her home. She did not really realize the value of that old crock until after she joined the RWCS and began reading the newsletter put out by Dave Newkirk. After submitting a photo of the old crock (Vol. 2, #1, Feb. 1978), she was very surprised to learn that what she had was a very rare item! Joyce has one of the few David Hallum crocks that are known to be left and it is in good condition.

The other known Hallum pieces are either in the Goodhue County Historical Society Museum or on display in the RWCS Foundation Museum.








# MID WINTER GET TOGETHER HAS RECORD ATTENDANCE!

change to Article III, Membership, that will be voted on at this year's annual business meeting. Proposed changes to Article III are underlined, and are an addition to the original bylaw.

Any person who appreciates stoneware and pottery, who subscribes to the beliefs set forth in the Preamble, Bylaws, and Rules and Regulations of the Red Wing Collectors Society, and pays their annual dues, shall be eligible to become a member of the Society. The

RWCS shall use a Primary/Associate annual membership fee structure. A Primary annual membership shall be afforded all the rights and privileges of the organization. An Associate annual membership shall be afforded all the rights and privileges of the organization except for the receipt of the newsletter. There must be at least one Primary membership per household address in order to have additional members at that address having Associate member status.



RWCS NEWSLETTER SIZE CHANGE: The U.S. Post Office has been more stringent with all types of mailings since last September, and we have had difficulty with the 2 ounce limit we must adhere to for the Newsletter mailing. Because of this, we need to slightly reduce the size of the Newsletter. The RWCS Board and the Newsletter Editors have decided to alter the trim size to meet the USPS requirements. This change will not adversely affect the amount of Newsletter content. In a time where we are all tying to be cost conscious, this decision will allow us to meet the weight restrictions of the Post Office and enable us to continue to send the Newsletter in a protective envelope to all members in a timely manner at the same postal rate. We wanted to make you aware of this minor change before it occurred.





yard. Using better quality clay from Goodhue township, Hallum had some success. He soon felt the pressure of others interested in establishing a much larger stoneware operation in the city. The company was listed in the Red Wing directory as being owned by Mitchell and Hallum, however the stencil on the items produced was "Minn. Pottery-D. Hallum."

An interesting note was that Newton H. Winchell included in his book "The Geology of Minnesota 1884-1901," a quote from a letter received by William Colvill. "Hallum was a very ingenious man and enthusiast. He had to learn kiln-making and burning by his own experiments."

In February 1877, a group of Red Wing business leaders created Red Wing Stoneware Company, capitalizing the firm at \$10,000. E.T. Howard was the superintendent of the facility. Hallum sold his interests to this new company. Proceeding cautiously, the new owners bought the kiln of Hallum and conducted stoneware manufacturing experiments through August of that year.

By January 1878, the owners were ready to order production to begin in a new 40 x 70 foot West End building. By mid-summer the plant turned out 6,000 gallons of high quality stoneware a week, and demand for its products grew.

There are very few stoneware pieces that have survived the years with D. Hallum's mark on them. You can see one of the crocks in the Red Wing Collectors Society Foundation Museum. There are also a couple examples in the Goodhue County Historical Society Museum in Red Wing. The following is the description of the Historical Society's pieces.

A 3 gallon salt glaze butter churn

crock with no dasher or lid. It has ear handles and is marked with a 3 near the rim. It is marked MINN. POTTERY- D. HALLUM in raised lettering. There are a few small chips inside and outside the rim edges and a modified turkey eye dropping just above the logo.

A butter churn attributed to Hallum has a dark brown interior with a blue 3. It is marked MINN. POTTERY- D. HALLUM and a small design is on the front. It has two handles and two sets of bands around the churn.

You can also find information on David Hallum in the Tefft's book, "Red Wing Potters & Their Wares, Third Edition." The resources for this article are from Fredrick L. Johnson's book, "Goodhue County Minnesota - A Narrative History" 2000 and the reference material of Sharon Bodelson's "History of the Red Wing Clay Industry" 1992.
