





For Paul Kosmatka, the February MidWinter GetTogether was especially memorable for this avid collector. Paul's parents were both dealers and collectors who were involved in the antiques industry throughout the years. They spent several years traveling in the Calumet, Michigan and upper-peninsula area and had acquired many unique Red Wing advertising pieces from the region. His parents bought and sold various pieces of stoneware and had inadvertently collected numerous Red Wing jugs with Martini advertising. Paul ended up owning the collection of Calumet jugs, accumulated by his parents, and had the opportunity to add to his collection at MidWinter. Here is the history behind these unique jugs.

Red Wing Stoneware companies produced many styles of jugs. Shoulder, cone top, common, druggist, fancy, and bee hive jugs to name a few. Although common and fancy jugs are often referred to as bee hives because of their shape, they were actually made in a mold. True bee hive jugs were hand thrown on a potter's wheel. Bee hive jugs were also never bottom signed, as the signature was part of the mold.

CLEANING STONEWARE

In the February issue of the Newsletter, there was a very informative article from Larry Roschen on practical ways to clean Red Wing dinnerware pieces. Now we will learn some tips on dealing with cleaning up stoneware pieces from Con Short.

Many of the RWCS members have had at least one piece of Red Wing stoneware in their collection at one time or another. In this article, I would like to share some thoughts and past experience on cleaning up stoneware. Obviously there is a difference in how you would handle salt glaze and zinc. There are two categories in regards to cleaning - just plain dirty and discolored from grease or foreign materials such as paint, rust or sodium. No matter what the size or condition is of the piece, the item first needs to be scrubbed with hot soapy water and then rinsed thoroughly.

To clean a hairline crack, an alternative to bleach is hydrogen peroxide. This can be purchased at any local drug store. Stronger hydrogen peroxide can be obtained at a hair salon. Place a strip of cotton over the hairline, then saturate it with hydrogen peroxide. Cover the cotton with something like Saran Wrap and tape it down to keep the cotton from drying out. This may need to be done several days in a row as it is a slow process, but it does work. This method also works on hairlines in art pottery and dinnerware. Larry Roschen uses a container filled with peroxide; I've only used it on hairlines.

To brighten salt glaze and zinc

stoneware, many collectors will use bleach. There seems to be a common fear of bleaching an item. I have bleached dozens of Red Wing stoneware pieces and not had any problems. (Except for the white spots on my clothes!) Use regular household bleach- Clorox, Hilex or Purex, not the less expensive brands. Some people use the bleach full strength, others dilute it. For large pieces, a 30 gallon plastic garbage can with a lid works well as a dip tank. Keep the tank outside or on a cement floor. Don't wear good clothes when doing this or checking on the progress, as you will splash something no matter how careful you are! Good quality rubber gloves will also save your hands.

Salt glaze bleaching is done differently than a zinc piece. If the salt glaze item has a hairline that needs cleaning, you can use the dip tank method. But be careful! If left too long in the bleach, the hairline will turn white. Frequent checking (every 10 minutes) is necessary. I scrub the piece with a green Scotch Brite scratch pad. When the piece appears brighter, remove it and rinse it with lots of water and/or let the piece set immersed in water. Turn the piece upside down and let it dry for a long time before setting it on carpet or any other surface that can be harmed by water or bleach. (The bleach and water have been absorbed through the porous bottom and continue to come out for a period of time.)

Zinc glaze stoneware may be left in the bleach tank overnight or longer. During the bleaching time, occasionally scrub the piece with a



green scrub pad. Rinse the piece well- use lots of water or soak it in water. The piece should be cleaner and brighter. Again, let it dry for a long time.

For grease stains in salt glaze or zinc pieces, put the piece in a 200 degree oven with the grease spot down. Place a pan underneath to catch the grease. You can also wipe the item now and then with a paper towel or Kleenex. It is best to do this when your wife is away, because it may take a day or two and emits a greasy smell! The grease stain may not completely disappear, but it should lighten noticeably.

Paint can be removed with any paint stripper – I've used Zip Strip and Bix. Put a small amount on at a time, let it work and then wipe it off. Small flecks of paint can be chipped off with your thumbnail or a knife. Commercial paint remover does not seem to hurt salt glaze or zinc. Wash the piece with hot soapy water and rinse it when finished.

If you are dealing with a rust stain, there are two rust removers that I've used: Lime Out and Whisk Rust Stain Remover, Both do a wonderful job of removing rust

from stoneware. Rust on stoneware is often the result of a wire repair or sitting a long time in water. The rust might have been there for years. Don't expect it to disappear immediately. Repeated use of the remover might be necessary. Because rust removers are liquid, they tend to run off a round crock and will damage counters or carpets, so use with care.

We think some white stains on salt glaze are caused by Water Glass which was used to preserve raw eggs. We've tried many things to remove these stains. As soon as the cooler dries, the white streak is back. Lime Away and other cleaners will remove some lime deposits, but not Water Glass. Please let me know if you have successfully removed this type of mark.

If one product doesn't work for you, try another one. The glaze on Red Wing stoneware is very tough. Don't worry about hurting it. Good luck!! Fancy jugs can be found with both Red Wing and Minnesota bottom signatures. The jugs were available in 1/8 pint, 1/4 pint, 1/2 pint, 1 pint, 1 quart, 1/2 gallon, 1 gallon, and 2 gallon sizes.

The fancy jug was popular with druggists and liquor merchants. It was bee hive shaped and had a two tone glaze, brown top with a white bottom. Adding an attractive advertising label on the white glazed portion of the jug made an eye catching vessel for any merchant.

The liquor business in Calumet, Michigan was flourishing at the turn of the century. Calumet was the copper mining capitol of the world, at the time, and the large population of miners supported many liquor distributors. They were all competing for their share of the lucrative market.

G. Martini was one of the more successful Calumet liquor dealers, and as the story goes, was a bit of an eccentric. Although Martini advertising can be found on several different style jugs, two styles are most predominant. The fancy jug and a "torpedo" shaped bee hive. He apparently wanted his jugs to be different than his competitors, so he requested that Red Wing make jugs to his specifications. There were two different style labels used on Martini jugs, G. Martini and G. Martini & Co.

The torpedo shaped bee hives were obviously made by Red Wing. They were custom ordered by Martini, as there are no known jugs in this style, displaying conventional Red Wing markings, (i.e.; wing and oval, birch leaves, etc.), nor has there ever been any

other merchants' advertising found on this custom shape. Although this style jug is scarce, it is typically found with the advertising label only. To date there are only (3) five gallon "torpedo" jugs, with wings, known to exist. Two of these winged jugs display Red Wing ovals in addition to the wing. The third winged jug is the only known advertising bee hive to have three colors on it, (a blue "5", a red wing and black advertising).

Martini also used the popular fancy jug style. A one or two gallon jug with his rather large, simple advertising oval is quite attractive. It is certain, that at one point, Martini requested fancy jugs larger than the available two gallon size. Apparently, Red Wing had to improvise to meet this customer's request. Red Wing addressed the need for larger fancy jugs by taking a hand thrown bee hive jug and

dipping the top half in slip. Once finished, the brown top, white bottom jug displaying Martini's label was a match for the smaller fancy jugs he also ordered for distribution. There are currently (2) three gallon and (1) four gallon two tone bee hive jugs, with Martini advertising, known to exist. These two tone, hand thrown bee hive jugs are quite unusual.

Obviously, G. Martini's flourishing liquor business enabled him to order enough jugs from Red Wing to demand special styles and shapes that were uniquely his. Perhaps these custom jugs were both Martini's trademark in the business, and testimony to his eccentricity.

If you would have been standing on the banks of the Mississippi in Red Wing 150 years ago, you would have witnessed an amazing sight: a whole armada of steamboats, full of rich and famous people heading upriver to the port of St. Paul.

The year of the first Grand Excursion was an important one for the Minnesota Territory: 1854 was the year St. Paul was incorporated as a city and Minneapolis, on the opposite bank, was surveyed for the first time. It was also in 1854 that the Chicago and Rock Island Railroad finished the first rail line between Chicago and the Mississippi. Within four years after the Grand Excursion, Minnesota was catapulted into statehood, and the entire region was positioned as a dominant force in the development of the nation in the 19th century.

In July of 2004, a parade of modern paddlewheel passenger boats, called Grand Excursion 2004, will repeat that 400-mile journey from the Quad Cities to the Twin Cities. The original trip helped introduce this part of the American frontier to the eyes -- and pocketbooks -of the country's leaders, and eventually the world's.

Organizers of Grand Excursion 2004 hope it will have the same effect now, showcasing the varied richness of the Mississippi and the towns along its banks in Illinois, Iowa, Wisconsin and Minnesota. The Grand Excursion 2004 plans started about a decade ago, and involves four states, more than 50 river communities, dozens of

organizations, 16 ports of call and at least 500 special events and celebrations along the way. The dates are June 25 to July 5, 2004. The big boats in the 2004 flotilla will be modern paddle wheelers that look just like the original ones. About 10 paddle wheelers are expected to participate, several which have docked in Red Wing many times over the years. The formal launch of Grand Excursion 2004 is June 25 in Davenport, Iowa. The Delta Queen and Mississippi Queen will travel longer than the rest, leaving St. Louis on June 23. The flotilla will end in St. Paul the afternoon of July 3. The two Queens will be docked in Red Wing on July 2, 2004, along with several other boats.

Special Events Along the Way

In more than 50 river towns along the way, the Grand Excursion will be celebrated with fireworks, parades, historic walking tours, special museum exhibits and lectures, parties, picnics, concerts, theater performances, regattas, water shows, fun runs, bike races, guided hikes, arts and crafts fairs and hot-air balloon rides. Many reenactments are also planned, depicting different eras in river history, including Native American camps, fur-trade rendezvous and Civil War-era battles and encampments.

Education is an important element of the whole event and will occur in the classrooms around the region. More than 825 schools have received a "River Exploration Trunk". Modeled after the luggage that early travelers used on

steamboat trips, the modern ones come packed with educational information and artifacts donated by the river towns for the students to learn from.

There will be several concerts during the event and tickets can be purchased for the performances now. On Friday, July 2nd join in the fun with the Johnny Holm Traveling Fun Show on stage at Bay Point Park 9:30 p.m.-12:30 a.m.

Saturday, July 3rd the Prairie Island Indian Community proudly presents The Little River Band performing on the Treasure Island Resort & Casino stage at Bay Point Park from 9:30 - 11:00 p.m. Kurt Jorgensen, winner of 7 Minnesota Music awards in 2003 will open the evening from 8 - 9 p.m.

Sunday, July 4th bring your friends and family to the Christian concert by the highly acclaimed group RIVER from 7:00 to 9 p.m. with a fireworks extravaganza immediately following the concert. RIVER is preceded by special guests 3Pete at 6:30 p.m.

Fort dodge stoneware the rest of the story



In the February issue of the Newsletter, you read about Fort Dodge Stoneware. Greg Steffens (pictured above), the author of the book, was the keynote speaker at MidWinter. Here is the condensed version of the rest of the story. To learn all the facts, you will need to get the book!

After the death of Martin White, his sons William and Arthur took over the business. The pottery was successful along with the Hartwell and Bower Pottery, which was located right next door. The various products produced by both potteries complimented each other's product lines and they merged together in 1892. This new company was called Fort Dodge Stoneware and proved to be a very successful merger.

On May 1, 1906, it was recorded that Albert Philpot of Chicago had purchased the Fort Dodge Stoneware Company land. The property was then deeded to the Western Stoneware Company and designated "Plant 7". Eight months later fire would wreak havoc at the plant. December 17, 1906 the Western Stoneware Company lost its Iowa flagship company in a fire that destroyed the plant.

After that, there was an attempt to start a new company, Plymouth Stoneware Company in Fort Dodge. Its main offices were located there but all of its production was conducted in the city of Marshalltown, Iowa.

After only a year in production, L.E. Armstrong sold the Plymouth Stoneware Company to a Red Wing, Minnesota stoneware company. The Red Wing Daily Republican reported the acquisition in the April 2, 1909 edition.

The demise of the Iowa stoneware industry came in May of 1910 when the Red Wing Union Stoneware Company closed its doors for the last time.
