



## A TIMELINE FOR TOWN AND COUNTRY DINNERWARE: SHAPES AND COLORS (PART 2)

The documentation provided in Part 1 of this article explains why some Town and Country colors and pieces are harder to find than others. However, it does not explain why Town and Country pieces were made in the Quartette colors (Figure 1), which were typically found on the Concord shape. Did Red Wing attempt to build on the success of Town and Country by introducing another dinnerware line that borrowed the Town and Country shapes?

A price list for July 1, 1951 titled "Informal Supper Service" (Figure 2) shows two lines, Festive and Patio along with a list of serving pieces. Both lines share the same serving pieces, but have different supper trays and cups. The Festive supper tray and cup both have a

square shape (Figure 3). The Patio supper tray closely resembles the comma shape found in the Town and Country dinnerware line, and the Patio cup is the same as the Town and Country line (Figure 4). The use of the comma shape, which was not used in any other Red Wing dinnerware line other than Town and Country, and the use of the Town and Country cup indicate that the Informal Supper Service is somehow connected to the Town and Country dinnerware line. The marmite, 13" salad bowl, condiment server, baker, 7"x5" relish dish, and lazy susan listed in the price list for the Informal Supper Service are all pieces designed by Eva Zeisel for the Town and Country line. These pieces were never part of the Concord line. Except for the supper trays and the Festive cup, it

appears that the Informal Supper Service is simply a collection of re-colored Town and Country pieces (see Figure 5.)

The theory is confirmed with a two page "Manufacturing Change Notice", dated June 21, 1951 (see Figure 6 and Figure 7.) This is an internal memo to workers outlining production changes to be made. Among the changes:

- 1) The Town and Country marmite, teapot, sugar, mustard, casserole, salt, creamer, platter, baker, and 7x5 relish were added to the supper line in Quartette colors.
- 2) The white lining for Town and Country marmites, teapots, sugars, mustards, casseroles, and cruets was eliminated. These pieces were to be solid color for all Town and Country and Quartette colors.
- 3) Any remaining white lined Town and Country pieces were to be glazed with Town and Country

colors, not Quartette colors. All Town and Country pieces in Quartette colors for the supper line were to be glazed in solid colors.

- 4) The Town and Country salt was to be presented with five holes for use as a pepper in the supper line.
- 5) 6" and 13" straight salad bowls were added in Quartette colors.

The manufacturing change notice documents that Town and Country shapes were added to the supper line (a.k.a. Informal Supper Service) in 1951. The salt and pepper for the Informal Supper Service was made up of two Town and Country salts; one with three holes to be used for

salt, and the other with five holes to be used for pepper (Figure 8.) The small Town and Country pepper in Quartette colors is a rare find and was likely a special order item.

Although the Town and Country line includes 6" and 13" salad bowls, the salad bowls used for the Informal Supper Service are not Town and Country shapes. Note that there is no Town and Country inventory number listed in the change notice for the salad bowls, and the change notice indicates that the bowls for the Informal Supper Service are to be 'strait' and 'jiggered'. Therefore, the salad bowls for the Informal Supper Service are similar in shape to Town and Country, but they have no tilt and a slightly wider base (Figure 9.)

The June 1951 production changes

confirm that the Informal Supper Service described on the July 1951 price list is comprised mainly of pieces from the Town and Country line in Quartette glazes. The Informal Supper Service appears on several other price lists from the early 1950s, but never with photos and never with any mention of the Town and Country name. Why not? Is there additional documentation that we have not yet seen? In addition to the Quartette glazes, Town and Country shapes have been discovered in other rare glazes that were not original to the Town and Country line. The Town and Country coaster has been found in red and blue glazes

(Figure 10). The authors have yet to find any documentation on these glazes.

Red Wing Potteries is also well known for pieces that were produced by workers during lunch hours. Very few Town and Country lunch hour pieces are known to exist. A white Town and Country pitcher with Kermis decorations is most likely a lunch hour piece (Figure 11).

Parts I and II of this article document the timeline for the shapes and colors of Town and Country dinnerware using a collection of vintage documents and brochures from Red Wing Potteries. There are periods of time that are not covered by the

documents presented in this article (1947-1950 and 1950-1953), and the authors are interested in finding original documentation to fill these gaps. 




Next year's theme is about collecting. If anyone is interested in doing a seminar please let Wendy Callicoat or Sue Jones Tagliapietra know.




## CONVENTION AUCTION HIGHLIGHTS


by Jeff Floyd Stoneware, Art Pottery, and Dinnerware were all hot items in a hot gym at the RWCS Convention Auction. A beautiful but repaired Salt Glaze Crock with a Bird sitting on a branch decoration sold for \$9500. It was also side-stamped Minnesota Stoneware. A 10 Gallon North Star Water Cooler with Butterfly Decoration went for a hot price of \$8100. Art Pottery was also in demand with a 24" Tall Floor Vase in a Brownish glaze, bottom signed, went for \$3200. A complete 8 piece set of Hamm's Service items sold for \$4100 with the original box. A Charles Murphy signed Dinnerware Test Plate with Christmas Decoration sold for \$900. The total sales for 316 items in the Auction was \$148,690.

The new lower commission rates probably led to higher sales at the Auction. We received a very favorable response to the lower rates, with more entries into the lottery and higher quality items. 




