## CONSERVATION AND REPAIR: WHAT EVERY COLLECTOR SHOULD KNOW

The decision to restore or repair an item is not always an easy one. There are many factors to consider, including the value of the item and your personal feelings on keeping the item in a private collection or the potential for resale. There are different sources to check to find a professional to restore or repair an item, including antique shops and dealers, antique or collector's

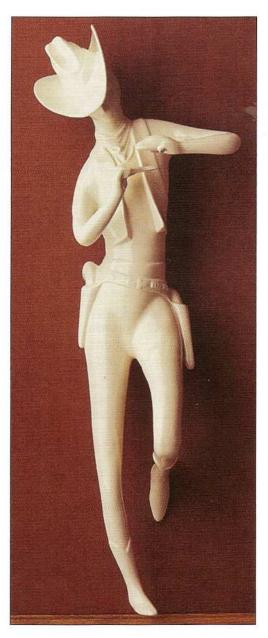
publications, reference books, the internet, and artisans who make pottery or stoneware items.

The means for ethical repair have existed for many years. There are limited, reliable sources for training and organizations to disseminate information about advances in materials and techniques.

Professionals in this field are aware of proven methods and the

risks are known, including the chances for discoloration, shrinkage, and long-term stability. Let's define the difference between conservation and restoration. Conservation refers to the processes which keep an object from harm, loss or future decay and preserves the true nature of the piece. This ethic and practice called art conservation is relatively new,

having evolved from the world of art restoration. With roots in the 1930's, the microscopes and x-rays advanced this field of study. Today the practice incorporates interdisciplinary studies in art history, studio art, chemistry and archaeology. Restoration means bringing an object back as close to its original state as possible through the concealment of damage. The term restoration can have a negative connotation due to deception and destructive alteration having little respect for the original condition.

Restoration can be a good thing and honestly done if all original surfaces are visible. Fillers and paints would be applied within the damaged areas only. There would be no attempts to disguise inherent damages such as glaze faults, kiln damages or slumping. There can be no fixing the original condition of an item. Restoration is true to the potter's original intent, which means not altering the damaged part(s). You should never paint over cracks or patches or parts of undamaged pottery. Soaking in household bleach can also cause additional damage. These tactics may be encouraged in books or on the internet but you need to be extremely careful. It is important to understand that alteration is not restoration. To restore means to make like the original, not add on or take off parts of an item. Alteration lessens the historic, aesthetic and monetary value of an item in the marketplace.

In order to reveal the original surface, an emphasis is placed on cleaning. Many times overspray restoration through the use of an airbrush is done to cover up stains, hairline cracks and simple break lines. Improvements in the use of certain detergents, solvents, mild acids and alkalis, steam wands, and cleaning solutions has allowed for the total removal of stains or lightened them considerably. This close attention to cleaning will reduce the need for additional, more invasive and costly repairs.

If you decide to have an item restored, many times the professional who will restore the item does not want anything done to the broken pieces. Leave them alone and let the professional thoroughly clean and begin to re-assemble the pieces. The pieces need to be as sterile as possible.

Traditional methods of restoration using the airbrush and various lacquers and paints to hide breaks and fillers are going to last less than ten years before obvious discoloration occurs. Feathered paint surfaces around damaged areas are applied so thinly that in the course of normal handling they may be rubbed off. The most disturbing aspect of this technique is the potential for deception.

Once yellowing occurs, the repair becomes visible and you are faced with the dilemma of condition.

Repair is really just gluing or fixing an item that may not be of high dollar value but has a degree of personal value.

The nature of the collectible market combined with the desire for well-conditioned items can place pieces in jeopardy and the history associated with the piece. It is important to educate collectors at all levels of these facts.

There will always be more items and artifacts in need of treatment than there are qualified people to meet those needs. Do-it-Yourself books and the one-week educational course may provide a starting point in the field of restoration; they should not be considered a qualification or a certification of professional practice. Regardless of the individuals background or our training we all have an obligation to honest stewardship of the items we own or sell.

This article and the article on page six (Some tips on what to look for when buying stoneware) was researched and written by the RWCS Newsletter Editor. Several sources were used to compile information, including reference books, websites and personal interviews with professionals in the industry.

### SOME TIPS ON WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN BUYING STONEWARE

It takes years of experience before you can master the details and discern an item as being in "mint" condition or being repaired. There are times when the practiced eye cannot tell the difference. We all hope that the people we purchase items from are honest and reliable but there are people who will knowingly take advantage of others if presented the opportunity. There are a few tips that the average person can practice to help them make a more educated decision.

Don't scratch an item with a metal key. It damages the item and you cannot always tell if it has been repaired. You can gently tap an area with a pen or a key lightly if you must. Stoneware will have a "ring" sound to it and a repaired/restored area will have a dull or dead sound to it.

Look at the surface and the texture of an item when you hold it up to the light. Is the surface "flatter" looking, (it does not reflect light the same all over) or is it shinier in one area versus another? Is there a consistent "orange peel" texture on the entire item? Examine the finish closely.

Color can be matched perfectly. Don't always go by the color, as imperfections and variances in color are normal for many pieces, even in their original state.

Many of the Red Wing Pottery items were utilitarian pieces and not fine china. They were created in a factory under less than ideal working conditions. Many of the crocks have hairline cracks that occurred naturally before they even left the factory, they are not the result of time or damage.

You can hold a piece of stoneware up to your cheek and feel the temperature. If one area is warmer than the rest of the piece, that is a clue that an item has been restored.

Steps involved in restoring
Safe cleaning
Stain removal
Glue/fillers
Making missing parts
Preparation for decorating
Painting and finishing
Airbrushing

If you have a question about an item, be sure to ask the owner about it. The owner may not be aware of an item's past but they should make an attempt to be as knowledgeable as possible.

For those who are investing in an expensive piece of stoneware and are not sure about the authenticity of an item, there is one test that will reveal 99% of the time any restoration that has been done. Ask the owner of the pottery piece to rub lacquer thinner over the piece. This removes virtually all finishes that were applied to an item during repair or restoration.

Today it is becoming more acceptable to have a "clean" restored item in a collection. There is still a strong value associated with a well-done restoration. It is important to price accordingly. There is an active market for restored pieces, especially for Red Wing items. Not every collector can afford "mint" pieces in their collection but they want to enjoy an item and this is one way they still can. ## $\mathcal{T}_{\mathsf{HE}}$ birch bark line from red wing potteries inc.

The Birch Bark Line was originally introduced in the fall of 1960. The line is comprised of 5 pieces introduced that fall and the 12" canoe that was added the following year. (see photo)

Each piece is finished using a semi-matte white glaze with a tan and brown wipe. The combination of the glaze technique and the mold design created the appearance of the bark of the white birch tree. The interior of each piece is glazed with a plain cinnamon brown color. Red Wing collectors have found a



"7th" piece of pottery that they believe was made by the Red Wing Potteries. The piece is a 10½" vase that bears no markings. The weight of the piece along with close study of the glaze and the design of the vase compared to the other 6 pieces of the Birch Bark line bring many collectors to the conclusion that the vase was made by Red Wing.

One theory related to the unmarked vase proposes that it was a prototype. For reasons unknown today the vase was never put into

production. There is also the possibility that a designer or other employee of the potteries made the pieces as a special project either for themselves or for presentation to the company as a possible new release for the Birch Bark Line.

#### Red Wing Collectors Society Board of Directors Meeting Chamber of Commerce October 19-20, 2002

In attendance were all Board Members, Kay Wilshusen, business manager, Pete May and Diane Bailey as guests. Wendy Callicoat the vice president was absent.

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 a.m.

Moved and carried to approve the minutes of the July 10, 2002 Board of Directors meeting.

Items voted via e-mail prior to the meeting were the approval to give "extra" commemoratives to the eight Key Note participants and approval to pay the annual stipends immediately following Convention.

The Historian's Report was given by Steve Brown recalling the positive promotion that the RWCS received at the Wisconsin Art Pottery Show through the Red Wing Pottery display.

The Business Manager's report was given by Kay Wilshusen.

6,402 active members as of 10/01/02 compared to 1/01/01 number of 6,329.

Newsletter distribution for 8/1/02 was 6,431 and 10/1/02 was 6,323 due to the change in the primary/associate membership.

The September financial report was reviewed.

This year there was a lower percentage of commemoratives that were of destructible quality. Moved and carried to destroy the surplus commemoratives.

Moved and carried to make no changes to the stipend amounts for 2003.

Other items affecting the final 2003 budget figures:

Moved and carried to increase the computer programming to \$8,550 for a

total of \$12,650. Motion carried.

Moved and carried to increase the donation line item to \$13,000 to reflect the actual interest accumulated to date and the projected amount to the end of 2002.

Moved and carried to increase the insurance-general line to \$5000 to reflect increased costs.

Moved and carried to increase the mileage for the Red Wing Office to \$1250.

Moved and carried to increase the Red Wing Office telephone to \$5000.

Moved and carried to increase the banner line to \$300 to reflect the possible new Chapter, repairs and hanging the banners. Motion carried.

Moved and carried to increase the budget to \$6000 in anticipation of producing a video of highlights of Convention for the traveling Display and other purposes for the RWCS.

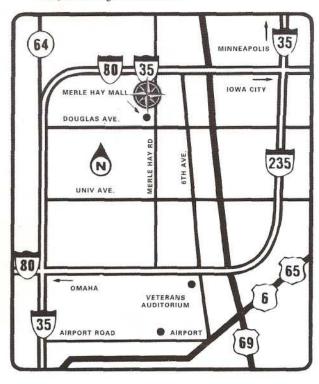
