REPAIR & RESTORATION REGISTER FEATURES RED WING ARTICLE

This fall we were contacted by the editor of "Collectors Journal", Connie L. Gewecke, to see if the Red Wing Collectors Society was interested in participating in a special section. This special section called "Repair & Restoration Register" was included in the October 19th issue of "Collectors Journal."

This sixteen page supplement has information from experts across all fields of collecting and antiques. In reviewing what would make the most sense to send, we decided that an article that was written by RWCS member Larry Roschen would make a good submission. The article, "Caring for stoneware", was featured on page three of the supplement. It was a full page article.

The article was a good primer on how to clean Red Wing dinnerware. It also talked about important features of clay, how to use bleach and remove greasy stains on dinnerware.

The article ended by sharing information on the RWCS and how to get additional information on joining or where to visit the website.

This article is another example of how placement in national publications can help keep the awareness of the RWCS in the forefront of collectors across the country. It also establishes the RWCS as an organization that has an active membership and a wide range of experts in all areas of Red Wing collecting.

PRELIMINARY RESULTS RWCS 2004 SURVEY

Survery results shared by Interim President Sue Jones Tagliapietra.

There was an outstanding response to the RWCS 2004 survey with nearly 700 completed surveys returned representing about a 12 percent return rate. The percentage of returns far exceeded our expectations and gives us a sample size that will allow the Board and committees to get valuable insight for future activities.

You will be receiving information about the results of the survey at MidWinter GetTogether and the July Convention as well as in future Newsletter articles. I did want to share, as promised, some preliminary results regarding the demographics of those who returned the surveys.

- Alternatives to the Banquet
- Recruiting New Members
- Commemorative Production

The Board, Office staff and Support Positions as well as the two special committees are reviewing the information relevant to their area of responsibility.

I want to extend my thanks to everyone who took the time from your busy schedule to complete the survey. Your responses are extremely valuable and will assist the RWCS in continuing to be an organization that is responsive to the needs and wishes of the membership.

MAYO CLINIC CONNECTION

The link between the Red Wing Stoneware Company and the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota was found in the Tissue Registry department. It is basically a library. Rather than books, it stored tissue and specimen's removed from patients in surgery and autopsies conducted at Mayo Clinic since 1905. It is still the largest tissue registry in the world today. A tissue registry is the most valuable source of material for clinical education and research work in anatomic and surgical pathology. The specimen's were placed in muslin bags and then submerged in 20 gallon crocks filled with formalin (a 10% formaldehyde solution). By 1971, there were 3,600 of the Red Wing stoneware crocks


being used. Smaller 1, 2 and 3 quart crocks and 1 gallon crocks were also used.

The Mayo Clinic began to use the Red Wing crocks in the late 1800s to the 1970s. There was a variety of crocks used; some were salt glazed and some had birch leaves. Of the crocks, over 90% were wing crocks purchased after 1905. It has been reported that through the years a total of 5,600 or more of these crocks had been used. All the crocks had covers and in later years, special crocks without wings and a unique flat cover were designed specifically for Mayo's use. In case you were wondering, no koverwates were ever used.

The crocks were stored on large shelves. The combination of crocks, specimens and liquid

(formalin) resulted in tons of weight. The older crocks kept he formalin quite well. But after a long period of time the wing crocks began to leak. In the 1970s Mayo ceased using the crocks due to the weight and leakage factor. Mayo then decided to convert to plastic containers for the storage of specimens. From 1985 to the present, sealed plastic bags were used.

In the mid 1970s the used crocks were






offered to Mayo Clinic employees. Up to 1,000 of the 20 gallon crocks with covers and 800 to 900 other crocks, with holes knocked in the bottom were offered. The crocks were to be used only as planters. It was discovered that some were sold on the secondary market and others were used for purposes other than a planter. Since the crocks once held formalin, they were unsafe for any other use. Mayo then took 3,600 of the 20 gallon Red Wing crocks and their covers to the dump and smashed them to pieces.

We have always found this Red Wing Potteries and Mayo Clinic connection to be very interesting and a part of the history of the Red Wing Stoneware Company. We would like to acknowledge Darrell Ottman and Michael Oelkers from the Mayo Clinic Tissue Registry for contributing information to this article.

\mathcal{T} HE JOHN H. RICH

There was another link between the Red Wing Stoneware Company and the Mayo Clinic that is very interesting. In the 1890s, the Red Wing Stoneware Company shared its office with the John H. Rich Sewer Pipe Works. In 1896, the J.H. Rich Sewer Pipe Works joined the Red Wing Sewer Pipe Company and became the Union Sewer Pipe Company. This was like a similar arrangement between the Union Stoneware Company. The companies formally merged into a single company called the Red Wing Sewer Pipe Company in 1901. John H. Rich, one of the presidents of the Red Wing Stoneware Company, was also the chairman of the Forest Products Company, located in Red Wing. This company owned a 220 ton stern wheel raft boat named the "John H. Rich." One of Mayo's founders, Dr. William J. Mayo, had a friendship with John H. Rich of Red Wing. Dr. William J. Mayo also had a great love of the Mississippi River. In 1910, Dr. William J. Mayo devised a plan to buy the well used, 220 ton stern wheel raft boat called the "John H. Rich." The plan was to purchase the boat from the Forest Products Company of Red Wing, Minnesota, in partnership with John H. Rich, the company's chairman and his brother, Dr.



Charles H. Mayo. There were also two other Mayo Clinic doctors involved in the partnership, for a total of five owners.

The stern wheel raft boat was totally renovated to be a pleasure boat. It was renamed the "Oronoco" and was used for rest and relaxation and to unwind with their family and friends on the Mississippi River.

TRADER VIC MAKES HEADLINES

In the October issue of the RWCS Newsletter, we had a fun story and pictures that featured Trader Vic pieces. The October 19, 2004 issue of "Collectors Journal" had their own article on these items and classified them as "zany characters of the ad world." The article was by Mary Jane Lamphier and titled, "Trader Vic's Menehune."

She describes the legends of the Polynesian Islands inhabitants, called the Menehune, as playful elves that were 2 to 3 feet tall and were shy forest dwellers who worked through the night. The Trader Vic restaurants were represented by Menehune in various forms. Lamphier goes on to discuss the history of the restaurant chain and the various items that were distinctly linked to Trader Vic. The character mugs, salt and

pepper shakers, swizzle stick ornaments, tall Tiki tumbers and other items were found to be very collectible in today's market. It is always exciting to come

across information that links the Red Wing Collectors Society with items and stories in national publications.

Dear Red Wing Collectors Society: After reading the latest article on Trader Vic in the October Newsletter, I was surprised to find out that the African figurine salt and pepper shakers might be Red Wing.

They are both exactly like your photo and marked, "Trader Vic" on their backs. Upon turning one upside down, a sticker that said, "Japan" was attached to the bottom. Please do not make any "cracks" about plans for a session on Stoneware Repair & Restoration!



AUCTION MANAGER NEWS

Happy Holidays! At the October RWCS Board Meeting, the Board discussed some changes in the RWCS Convention Auction. As a result of a Board vote, we have changed the commission rates on the Convention Auction. Beginning in July 2005, we will no longer have a 12% commission rate. We have changed to a sliding scale commission rate. The new rates are as follows: items selling for less than \$100 will be charged a \$10 minimum commission. Items selling from \$100 to \$2499 will be charged a 10% commission. Items selling from \$2500 to \$9999 will have a 7.5% commission. Items selling for \$10,000 and over will have



FIRST RWCS FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIP AWARDED

The Red Wing Collectors Society
Foundation has functioned on a
very carefully planned use of
limited funds. The RWCS, Red
Wing collectors, and Foundation
Board members have generously
donated time, money and effort to
put together a very fine Museum
in the first four years of the
Foundation. Board members
continue to make plans for new
displays and look forward to more
Chapter involvement in our
mission to continue expansion of
this fine Museum.

As a public foundation, the RWCS Foundation has to meet several requirements to retain our 501(c)(3) nonprofit status as we are audited at the end of this year. One area of the audit relates to another important mission of the Foundation, providing education about the pottery industry in Red Wing and recognizing the work of outstanding, promising young potters. To these ends, Board members presented several seminars at the Museum, and this year, the Foundation carefully reserved \$500 to present the first Red Wing Collectors Society Foundation Award. This award was presented by the Red Wing Collectors Society Foundation through the Northern Clay Center (NCC) in Minneapolis to "a deserving individual who is pursuing a career as a potter or who is studying or researching historical aspects of the pottery industry. The Red Wing Collectors Society Foundation endeavors to broaden appreciation of pottery, past and present, for the general

public and maintains the Red Wing Pottery Museum in Red Wing, Minnesota."

Becky Chappell is the first recipient of the RWCS Foundation Award. She recently graduated from the Cleveland Institute of Art and has moved to Minneapolis. (Interestingly Red Wing designer Charles Murphy also began his training at the Cleveland Institute in the 1930s.) She works at the Northern Clay Center as a materials technician and has a studio there. Pete Scherzer, Studio Manager at NCC, worked with Becky in Cleveland and was highly impressed with "her talent and seriousness" as she pursues a career in making pottery in Minneapolis.

Ms. Chappell was a luncheon guest of the Foundation Board the day of

our annual fall meeting. The Board presented her with the Foundation award in front of the kiln remains at Pottery Place Mall. We were delighted to see slides of her work. She has thrown some attractive tall elegant porcelain pieces done in white glaze. We look forward to seeing more of her work in years to come.

Again the Foundation Board appreciates all of your help and support as we move forward with preserving a history of the pottery industry in Red Wing for generations to come.

\mathcal{R}_{ED} wing items in demand across the country

If you have been reading any of the antique or collecting magazines the past several months, you may have noticed an increase in the number of times Red Wing items have been noted. In larger auction ads you will see photos of Red Wing items that will be featured in upcoming auctions. The auction roundups and reviews have also been reporting the prices for the Red Wing items on a more regular basis.

So what does this mean? That outside of the membership of the RWCS, the demand for Red Wing items is strong and they are getting plenty of notice from people across the country. The photos and auction results are sent to the national publications by auctioneers. Here are a few of the items that have recently garnered attention.

The "Antique Week" September 27th issue of the Auction Roundup showed a photo of three Red Wing Union Stoneware Co. crocks; a 40 gallon that sold for \$1,800, a 50 gallon that sold for \$2,000 and a rare 60 gallon for \$3,300. This particular sale was in Salisbury, Missouri. There was also a 30 gallon Red Wing crock that sold for



\$600 and a 1 gallon crock with a lid with only a wing on it that went for \$550.

The October 5, 2004 issue of "Collectors Journal" featured a large color photo on the front page with the title, "Red Wing beehive jug commands final bid of \$4,100". This jug was sold at a Garnavillo, Iowa auction. It was the item that brought the highest price that day. There were five phone bidders who were also participating in the auction

action. There was also several other Red Wing items mentioned in the article. The "Collectors Journal" also had a mention of the Red Wing 60 gallon crock.

The October 12, 2004 issue of "Collectors Journal" featured a six gallon Red Wing crock that realized \$90 in the Under the Hammer section. The next week the October 19 issue had a photo and information on a 20 gallon Red Wing crock that realized \$600 at a Memphis, Missouri auction.

The November issue of "Antique Trader's Collector Magazine & Price Guide" gave the RWCS a full page to report on the annual July Convention auction.

In the Auction Action Showcase, they featured photos of a 30 gallon salt glaze crock, a 5 gallon salt glaze water cooler, a 5 gallon Red Wing crock double stamped and a Red Wing German spittoon. The article covered the RWCS auction highlights. This helps educate other collectors of the value of Red Wing items and introduces the wide range of Red Wing pieces to other pottery collectors across the nation.

Motion by Wendy Callicoat seconded by Jerry Erdmann to approve the budget for 2005 as amended.

The meeting adjourned at 10:26 AM. The next BOD meeting is scheduled for February 11th /13th in conjunction with the MidWinter Convention in Des Moines, Iowa.


ATLANTIQUE CITY SHOW
