Just Part of the Act

GARY TEFFT

I WAS WATCHING old movies on cable a while back, when I thought I might have spied some Red Wing stoneware in It Happened One Summer, the 1945 version of State Fair (retitled for television). At the beginning of the story, the mother is preparing mincemeat to enter in the Iowa State Fair competition and isof course-using stoneware jars. The jars are white-glazed and look for all the world like Red Wing, though no marks are visible. Later in the film a blue-sponged pitcher is seen at the campground where the family stays. This led me to think about other appearances of Red Wing I've noticed in movies or television.

When decorating a movie or television set, a prop department attempts to represent a time period to reinforce character development, so it is not surprising that Red Wing should appear on the screen now and then, though not always in a historically accurate context. In The Conebeads, the pointy-headed aliens from Remulac (played by Dan Aykroyd and Jane Curtin) had a Red Wing violin planter (#M1484) on the wall of their mobile home. This scene is early in the movie, when Beldar and Prymaat are starting out their life on earth after crash-landing their spaceship. The violin planter went out of production slightly earlier than the time period represented, but would have been appropriate as a secondhand acquisition by a young couple.

Possibly the same planter was used as a prop in the main character's appartment in the 1995 Pauly Shore movie Jury Duty, which played off the O. J. Simpson trial. In this case the prop reinforces the kitschy nature of the apartment and its occupant.

One of the sequels in the Friday the 13th series has a 15- or 20-gallon, wing-decorated jar in the house of one of the teenage victims. Here, the message is obviously how normal the family is—everyone uses large crocks as wastebaskets, don't they?

My daughter informs that The Diary of Anne Frank (1959) contains a 5-gallon, wing-decorated jug in the attic scene just as the Nazis are breaking in downstairs. Don't you wonder how that jug made it across the Atlantic?

Numerous westerns use-or misusestoneware. White-glazed jugs often show up in movies representing a time period during which salt-glazed or brown would have been the norm. I have seen a wing-decorated, 3-gallon jug in a film set in the 1890s. I don't recall the title, but it was a major studio release and might have been a John Wayne film.

It was another western, seen at the Auditorium theater in Red Wing back in the 1950s, that contained my first notice of moviedom's recognition of the importance of my hometown. It had a lawman in Northfield, Minnesota rushing into the telegraph office after the bank had just been robbed. He excitedly instructs the operator, "Wire the sheriff at Red Wing and tell him that they're headed his way!" The movie was possibly the The True Story of Jesse James (1956), starring Robert Wagner and Jeffrey Hunter, that was a remake of the 1939 Jesse James with Henry Fonda. The 1939 film was on cable recently and although many of the scenes seemed familiar, it did not include the crucial passage, unless it had been edited for television.

More recently, Jack Lemmon and Walter Matthou starred in Grumpy Old Men and Grumpier Old Men, set in Wabasha, just 30 miles downriver from Red Wing. The two play lifetime rivals who discover the bond between them while competing for ladyfriends and fishing holes. Some outdoor scenes for the first film were shot in

Red Wing's Memorial Park. In the second, Lemmon actually utters the name of the mystic city as he describes how far a giant catfish could tow his boat.

Red Wing, music by Kerry Mills, lyrics by Thurland Chattaway, an old standard that has long been the City's adopted anthem, is the fabled tale of an indian maiden whose brave is lost in battle. "Now the moon shines tonight on pretty Red Wing. The songbird's sighing and Red Wing's crying."

Musical icon and Minnesota native Bob Dylan recorded The Walls of Red Wing, a youthful chant alluding to the State reform school, which was legendary as the juvenile equivalent of Alcatraz when I was growing up. His more well-known Highway 61 Revisited takes its name from the highway which runs through town and past the school.

Red Wing dinnerware has been immortalized in the form of a Bob White coffee cup held by the February 1956 Playboy Playmate of the Month in her centerfold photo.

On remodeling wizard Bob Vila's Home Again series, a house in the Southwest was decorated with collectible pottery. A white, Red Wing vase was pointed out in one segment.

Perhaps the most obscure connection was included in the credits of the 1956 science fiction film, The Mole People, starring Hugh Beaumont. Listed was an actor named Robert (or something) Redwing. I've not found any further notice of work by this person, although it is possible that he later changed his name to Redford . . . or maybe not.

If you notice a piece of Red Wing or a reference to the city in a movie, book or song, send it in to the Newsletter. I'll even give you some prospects: try the original, 1933 version, or the 1962 remake of State Fair. Watch for that mincemeat scene!

Message from the Editor

FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF CLARIFICATION AND AMPLIFICATION: Greg Houda of Jackson Hole, Wyoming wrote to tell me that the 3-lb spongeband butter pail listed in the *Prices Received* column of the September-October *Newsletter* had the advertising garbled. The piece that sold had "IT PAYS TO TRADE MAX BROTHERS, KAYLOR, SO. DAK" advertising, not "MAY BROS. TRIPP." Tripp is the auctioneer, it turns out. Houda wrote

My brother-in-law, wife and I were all at that Tripp auction and saw the piece in question sell. We remembered it, because just two weeks before—and only 15 miles away—a friend bought the same exact 3-lb spongeband butter pail with lid and bail and the same "MAX BROTHERS, KAYLOR, SO. DAK." advertising. However, she bought hers at a garage sale and paid only \$2.25, as opposed to the \$825 at the auction!

FURTHER CLARIFICATIONS: In last month's *Questions & Answers* column there was a typo. The girl figurine's shape number is 1121, not 1211. Sorry.

Another item in the last issue's *Questions & Answers* provoked comment from various quarters. The question was about the Magnolia-painted vase, shape number H-505. Sue Jones Tagliapietra asserted that the H stood for "hand painted." Wally Armstrong wrote that he had always heard the H stood for Russel "Teddy" Hutchson, the Red Wing modeler who was reputed to have designed many Red Wing shapes.

Tagliapietra was remembering a passage in *Red Wing Art Pottery* by Ray Reiss (p. 49), one that I remember well, because at the time the book was being written, I queried it. Reiss pointed out to me that he had found absolutely no documentation supporting the Hutchson theory.


I revisited the issue when Ron Linde also communicated his concern about this issue, and sent me a xerox of the catalog sheets from the *Hand Painted* series as well as a photo of a vase from the series that was produced in a solid glaze, without any painted decoration.

I continue to think the H stands for *Hand Painted*. All of the shapes in this very limited series have broad surface areas left purposely blank for decoration. There is no in-mold surface decoration, ornamentation or embellishment of any kind. The only deviation from straight line or broad, curved surface is at the top of the rounded pieces, where the rim folds over slightly. And only one of the square shapes, number H-511, breaks out by peaking at the four corners of the rim.

These shapes were clearly selected as "canvas" for the hand painted designs. Although some of these pieces might have been designed by Hutchson, it's very unlikely that the H designation is for him. After all, why would a long-time modeler choose these essentially plain shapes to sign, when he would presumably have done other much more interesting work and left it unsigned?


Then why put the H on the vases, when there are, as Wally Armstrong points out, some of these vases with the additional red ink stamp HAND PAINTED?

I contend that the H designation probably signaled to factory workers that these Art Pottery vases were not to follow the usual production route to

glazing, but were to be directed instead to the dinnerware department for decoration. The red ink stamp was probably added as a marketing device, as the H designation would mean nothing to the consumer.

Need help identifying something? Or is there something about Red Wing that you've always wanted to know but didn't know who to ask? Q I need belp in identifying this bowl. The diameter is 10-1/2" at the top. Is it Red Wing? Some variation on the red and blue banded bowls? I've combed my Red Wing material, thinking I'd seen some picture that was similar, but I have been unable to locate that picture to give to you as a reference. I paid \$50 for the bowl in July, 1996 in Missoula, Montana. If it's not Red Wing, I'll probably sell it. But what is its current value?

GARY TEFFT: Bowls of this style were shown on the *Red Wing Stoneware* and Stoneware Specialities poster circa 1930. They were described as being decorated with blue and red bands, but blue and pink would be more accurate. Obviously, they were made in other colors, like your blue and white banded yellow ware, or saffron ware variant. We've seen another variant with *green* sponge in a band around the rim! We'd say that \$50 was a fair price for your unsigned bowl.



Q My busband and I were out prowling around in Spokane several years ago. We stopped for lunch at a Taco Time and right across the street was a very urban-looking antique store. We always like the more country places, but we decided to take a quick look anyway. To our delight we found this gray Red Wing bulldog. You can see the bisque on the bottom of his feet and stomach where the gray paint has worn off. I don't think it's ever been fired. Can you tell us something about it and what it's worth?

GARY TEFFT: Wow! It's rare enough to find one of these with all of its legs attached in its usual, fired condition, but to have remained intact in an unfired state would be really amazing. Your saying that it is bisque underneath implies that it *bad* been fired, although possibly not to full stoneware maturation temperature, (before being coated in glazing slip). Dried, unfired ware is called "greenware" and it is extremely fragile so I doubt that's what this is. Chances are this was fired but not glazed.

We list the usual, glossy-brown bull-dogs at \$500 to \$600.

Q I came across this 20-gallon Perfection Sanitary Self Draining Jar with a six-inch wing at a little antique store in North Dakota last summer. It is in very good condition as is its button-top lid. It is tapered at the bottom (funnel-shaped) with a copper spigot at the bottom center. I had to build a special wooden stand in order to display it. Personally I have never seen a piece like this.





However, after asking around, I found a few people who know of these "jars" but who know little about them. My questions are 1) Why was this type of

"jar" produced and what was it used for? 2) Can it be dated? 3) Is it a rare piece or is it common? 4) What is its approximate value to a collector? I paid \$400 for it. Did I find a deal or did I get taken for a ride?

GARY TEFFT: These self-draining jars were produced for industrial use in storing and deliverying liquids. They first appeared in *The Red Wing Line* catalog, which was issued around 1920, but simply with an oval, not the nifty "Perfection" logo. I believe that they stayed in the product line through the 1930s, perhaps even to the end of stoneware production in 1947. Because of its large wing, I'd date yours to 1930 or earlier. I'd not call them common, but Bonnie once visited a shop in northern Illinois that had a number of them, each filled with hard candy for sale. Because

they are a "speciality" product, and yours appears to be outstanding in appearance, I don't think you were taken for a ride at \$400, though we list the more mundane-appearing ones lower.



Q I recently purchased these two 20-lb crocks, one at the Convention and the other a week later at an auction. As I was comparing the two, I was surprised to notice the different styles of numbers and letters. Is this common or is one style more rare? Is it possible to date the crocks based on the typestyle? —Doug Arndt, Rockford, IL

GARY TEFFT: Gee whiz, Doug, I thought that I was the only person who obsessed about this sort of thing! I've never noticed this particular variation before, but I plead poverty: never being able to afford to own two of these jars at the same time. There are collectors who specialize in butter jars though and I bet that some of them have noticed this before, and might offer an observation on rarity. In general, clearer wings were more often found on earlier pieces, but I don't know if it applies to your jars.

NICOL KNAPPEN: The minutiae of typography is *my* territory. The type of the bottom crock is called Caslon. It is an old,

classic typeface that has been in constant use for hundreds of years. The type on the top crock has elements of several typefaces, but I cannot identify it from just five characters. I can tell you the face has oblique (transitional) hammer serifs, but you knew that. Chances are it is a hand-drawn custom typeface without a name. Up until about ten years ago, all typefaces were hand-drawn, and artists often combined elements of different typefaces to come up with something unique. Although Caslon is commonly used in the present day, and the typeface on the top crock is not (at least not with any regularity), I would venture to say that the top crock is the newer. The way the Caslon face is drawn (heavy and slightly condensed) suggests to me that it predates the more "modern" typeface on the top crock.




Q In 1988 I bought this canning jar at an auction. It says hansen's medium sweet pickle / the blair cider, vinegar and pickle factory. The side has a square and says safety valve pat'd may 21, 1895 with a logo of a triangle and an H and G. It is bottom marked (M8) minn s co red wing minn. The ½ gallon jug was bought at another auction in 1990 and is printed gross & printz liquor co / 1524 larimer st / denver, colo. It has no bottom mark. I would like any information you might have about them and their value.

GARY TEFFT: Your pickle jar is a "Safety Valve" canning jar, which the Red Wing companies produced under an arrangement with the Hamilton Glass Comany, who held the patent and whose logo appears on the jars. The metal clamping device for the lid is a rare prize in itself, as most rusted away

over the years. We list one at \$125 to \$175, in our current price guide, but yours might bring more with its underglaze advertising.

I'm not sure of the maker of your jug, it doesn't appear to be a Red Wing product. Possibly it was made by the Western Pottery of Denver. It is my opinion that a liquor advertising jug would bring a minimum of \$75, perhaps more in the Denver area.



Q This stoneware butter churn was given to me some years ago by my mother who had used it for several years. Could you please tell me something about it and its approximate value?

GARY TEFFT: Your churn appears to be a nice example of a 4-gallon, salt-glazed churn with a decoration that has been named by collectors the "lazy-eight target," or simply "lazy-eight." All of the large Red Wing factories used this decoration in the salt-glaze era, as did many other potteries from New England and the Midwest. Yours has a lot of characteristics common to Red Wing-produced ware, so that might well be assumed to be its point of manufacture. A good, salt-glazed churn, even though unsigned, should bring about \$400 these days.

You should have already received your RWCS Convention Registration Packet in the mail. If you have not received it yet, please call 1-800-977-7927 and talk

to the Membership Committee. They will get one to you as soon as possible. Once again this year, the Commemorative, Auction and Convention Committees have color coordinated their forms for your convenience. Please fill these out as soon as you get them so that they don't get lost.

The ivory Registration Form and return envelope in the RWCS Convention Registration Packet is for you to register for the usual Thursday-through-Saturday Convention. We are keeping the schedule of events for Thursday through Saturday the same as past Conventions. That way, no one misses out on the fun of finding out what the commemorative is and all of the other exciting things that are a part of Convention every year. We are adding several other fun things to do for the rest of the week this year. The "hands on" seminars and exhibits will be detailed in the April/May Newsletter along with information on how to sign up for them.

We are planning a fun-filled week for Convention to help commemorate the 20th Anniversary of members getting together at our annual Convention. The week-long celebration will start Sunday, July 6, with an outdoor antique show in the beautiful streets of Red Wing. The City will close off some streets in the downtown area for antique vendors to sell their wares. This antique show will begin at sunrise (for all you early birds) and run till approximately 4 pm. Immediately following will be a

children's parade at Baypoint Park. This parade will be for any child aged 2 to 12. Kids will decorate their bikes, trikes, skateboards or rollerblades with flowers and be judged for the best of show. After the kiddy parade, there will be a special presentation to all of the RWCS current charter members. There will be music and special speakers that you will not want to miss.

The pieces in this display will be brought to the RWCS Convention by collectors and loaned to the exhibition for the Convention week.

There will be two auctions held in

Thursday, July 10, through Saturday, July 12, will be similar to past Conventions. But this year we are adding an event on Sunday, July 13. We will have an opportunity to enjoy brunch at the famous St. James Hotel on the 5th floor starting at 9:30 am. We will have the whole 5th floor to ourselves from 9:30 to 10:30 before the other hotel guests and visitors will be allowed to participate. In our opinion, this brunch is one of the best in Minnesota, and the view is spectactular.

This will be a Convention to remember! Don't miss it—mark it on your calendar!

Convention Auction '97 is only a few months away. You should have received your Convention packet containing your Auction Registration Form. The only significant change

from last year is the commission rate for '97 will be 12% (as outlined in the November-December *Newsletter*). All other major guidelines will be the same as 1996.

The lottery system will again be used to select the items for the Auction. Items will be drawn from Registration Forms *postmarked* by May 1, 1997. Remember only one Registration Form may be used per address no matter how many memberships are at that address.

The Auction Committee will notify

members by postcard that your Registration Form has been received. By the third week of May, approximately, you will receive another postcard notifying you whether or not your item was drawn for the lottery. In order to prevent *no-shows* in the Auction, if you do not receive your postcard by June 1, 1997, please call the Auction Committee directly—not the hotline—to personally check whether your piece was drawn in the lottery. We would rather have phone calls than no-shows.

Auction checks will once again be mailed out by the Treasurer one week after Convention. Remember to bring your SASE envelope with you when you drop off your Auction item. There will be the minimum commission charge of \$12 on items consigned to the Auction that sell for less than \$100. Any item that sells for more than \$100 will be charged the 12% commission rate. We feel this change improved the quality of last year's auction. Most members realized that they were better off not submitting common or damaged pieces. We again urge members not to use the Convention Auction as a bump, scratch and dent sale.

Once again no additions or substitutions will be allowed. If your Registration Form submitted lists a 3-gallon handturned water cooler and you bring in a 4-gallon molded water cooler, it will not be accepted.

As in past years, acceptable items for the Auction are Stoneware, Art Pottery and Dinnerware items. Also acceptable are items relating to the pottery history of Red Wing such as memorabilia.

The only mutliple items that will be allowed are RWCS Commemoratives, or items originally sold as a set, such as *Round Up* Dinnerware.

There will be a limit of 15 RWCS Commemoratives in the Auction. No 1996 Commemoratives will be allowed. No modern day reproductions can be submitted. Chapter Commemoratives may be submitted by the Chapter Presidents only and must be the most recent year. These Chapter Commemoratives will be subject to the lottery.

No altered pieces may be submitted. All items must be in their original form.

Please keep in mind that you will be submitting a Registration Form far in advance of the actual Auction. You must be prepared to hold your piece until you are notified in May that you have or have not been selected in the lottery. Think carefully before you submit your entry. If your item is confirmed for the Auction but does not show up at Convention, you will forfeit your Auction privileges for 1998 and further.


