Remembering the first rwcs convention saturday, july 9th, 1977

As we prepare for the July Convention, it's always interesting to look back at how everything started. In 2001, the RWCS will celebrate 24 years of organization. However, this year will also mark the 25th commemorative and 25th annual Convention. For those of you who were there at the first informal gathering in 1977, this will be a pleasant trip down memory lane. For those who have joined in the recent past, this will be a history lesson.

The first informal gathering of people who had an interest in Red Wing pottery occurred on Saturday, July 9th, 1977. The activities were held at the Goodhue County Historical Society Museum, where displays of stoneware and pottery were viewed by approximately 300 people. Lyndon Viel was there and he sold and autographed his new book, Clay Giants.

A business meeting, social hour and banquet were held in the St. James Hotel. Officers were elected and several issues were discussed. Dave Newkirk presented some special awards and Lyndon Viel was the keynote speaker. Some of

the key issues that were decided that day included:

- Hold a second Convention in Red Wing in July, 1978
- Recognize all American made pottery
- Have a day long Show and Sale with members-only in the morning
- Limit attendance at Convention activities to members only
- Work with the Goodhue County Museum to encourage donations
- Establish membership dues
- Establish charter members as those who joined as of July 9, 1977
- Appoint two members to look into production of a commemorative piece for the 1977 Convention

At the first Convention there were no commemoratives available. So it was decided that Jewell Peterson and Rosa Larson would create the first commemorative. The 1977 salt-glazed crock was hand-thrown and decorated in cobalt blue with the Convention logo impressed on the back.

We visited with Jewell Peterson and asked her to share some memories of that first Convention.

"Who ever thought it would get

so big?" said Jewell. It was so much fun getting together with other people who enjoyed collecting Red Wing items. It was all so new and everyone wanted to learn from each other. Jewell and Rosa Larson went to auctions together all the time. Jewell drove and Rosa was the navigator. The idea for the first commemorative came from an auction they attended. Jewell spotted a very

unique salt glazed crock that had thinner walls than any other crocks she had ever seen. She did not end up with the crock, but never forgot it.

Jewell and Rosa worked with potters Bob Brodderson and Dave Kenyon of Spring Valley, Wisconsin to create the first commemorative. They had 250 commemoratives that sold for \$7.50 each and Jewell had to take out a loan to cover the costs. The 1977 commemoratives were sold at the 1978 Convention along with the Common Jug, which was that year's commemorative. After a couple of years, they still had some 1977 crocks left. Jewell had a little antique shop in her garage and was known as the "Crock Lady" and she has really enjoyed the friendships that developed over the years with other Red Wing collectors.

Another charter member who shared his thoughts on the beginning of the RWCS is Wayne Bell. Wayne and his wife LaDonna spent many weekends at antique shops, flea markets and shows looking for interesting pieces. They bought their first set of dishes in 1946 from the Red Wing Minnesota Stoneware Company. The dishes were ridiculously cheap, according to Wayne, and were displayed on long wooden tables.

When Wayne discovered from a friend, who was a "picker" for antique dealers, that Red Wing pieces were going to become highly collectible, he and his wife really began to look for Red Wing items. At that time people were

glad to get rid of the early Red Wing pieces because they were heavy. Their collection of crocks and jugs grew and they had almost a full range of butter jars. His wife had an uncanny eye for things that would later really increase in value. Many days they would come home with a trunk full of pottery and covered with dirt from digging around in antique shops.

When they heard that there was going to be a gathering of Red Wing collectors in Red Wing, they attended. Lyndon Viel signed them up as charter members. People had blankets spread out on the lawn of the Goodhue County Historical Society Museum with their collections on display. Wayne remembers Lyndon as a very interesting man with a great sense of humor who was very enthusiastic about Red Wing pottery.

Wayne also recalled that Jewell Peterson knew that LaDonna collected Old Provincial dinnerware. When they attended auctions and had plans to bid on these pieces, Jewell would encourage other people in the audience not to bid on the items so LaDonna would get them at a good price. "Jewell is a great lady", said Wayne.

"The beginning of the RWCS was like a family, with people sharing pictures of their collections and having fun," Wayne remarked. The Society has grown so much since that first get together but Wayne always tries to attend the annual Convention and look up old friends.


TAMPICO BIRDHOUSE



During the MidWinter GetTogether in Iowa, we had the chance to see a very unique photograph of some rare Red Wing pieces. Here is the story behind the photo.

Michael Lunkwitz has known about Red Wing Pottery from a young age. His mother and her antique dealer friend were always searching for Red Wing pieces when he was growing up. Michael enjoys collecting salt glaze and unique Red Wing pieces.

This past winter, Michael and a friend were visiting a museum in Nebraska. His friend noticed a

Red Wing jug on display and pointed it out to him. Next to the jug was a photo taken during the Trans Mississippi Exposition, which was held in Omaha in 1898. The Trans Mississippi Expo was a gathering similar to the Chicago World's Fair, where companies would bring their products to display and sell to people.

This photo intrigued Michael, as it had some unique jugs in it. There were several 15 and 20 gallon jugs that said Union Stoneware and Elephant Ear jugs. The finishes

looked like they could possibly be zinc, and if so, they would be transition pieces. There were also beehives with numbers on them and no wings. He had never seen this photo in any of the Red Wing books he had read.

Michael did additional research and here is more information on the Expo.

The Trans Mississippi
International Exposition of 1898
and the concurrent Indian
Congress featuring 35 tribes were
held in Omaha, Nebraska from
June 1, 1898 through November 1,
1898. The Exposition showcased
the developed West from the
Mississippi River to the Pacific

Coast. Business and community leaders from the 24 states and territories lying west of the Mississippi River envisioned the Trans Mississippi Exposition as a way to revitalize the regional economy and to show that the West had recovered from the financial panic of 1893.

During the four months of the Expo, over 2,600,000 people came to view its 4,062 exhibits.

President William McKinley visited the Exposition on October 15th. The exhibits featured social achievements, economic productivity, and community growth of the western region. The Expo covered 108 city blocks, and

it was referred to as the "White City" because of the large white buildings that were erected. The Exposition's monumental and elaborate temporary buildings were constructed of wood, plaster and horsehair in order to keep costs to a minimum. The buildings were razed soon after the Exposition closed.


ITEM #1

I wanted to let you see my fantastic find. It seems like Red Wing in good condition is harder to find. But every once in a while you get lucky.

A The area where the colbalt doesn't show is where the crock got too hot in the kiln and the cobalt burnt off. It was one of the most time consuming decorations to do because of having to stop and start each circle.

Depending on condition, the value would be \$2,000 - \$3,000.




ITEM #2

I bought this 3 Gal. Bee-hive Salt Glaze jug recently and think it might be a Red Wing (not marked). Can you tell me something about it?

A 3's are a hard size to find in decorated salt glaze beehives. Beautiful blue cobalt on this piece. The 3 and the markings are not typical of Red Wing. It was made in the late 1800's, and not likely Red Wing because of the markings.

Estimated value is \$250 - \$350



ITEM #3

I recently purchased a 5-gallon butterfly churn for \$40 at a second hand store and would like to know if it is Red Wing and what it might be worth?

A This 5-gallon salt glaze butterfly churn has a beautiful cobalt decoration on it. Churns are probably the most difficult salt glaze piece to verify

for sure that they are Red Wing unless they are signed. The 5, the -.-, and the butterfly, are all possibly Red Wing. Many decorators traveled from one company to another depending on work, so therefore a Red Wing design might be used at another stoneware company. Without a good picture of the handles, glaze, and the clay, it is difficult to know for sure.

With the limited information we have, we lean towards it not being a Red Wing piece.


Motion by Steve Brown and seconded by Paulette Floyd to grant approval for the use of RWCS logo on kids seminar bags for July Convention. Motion carried.




