



## $\mathcal{T}_{\mathtt{WENTY-FIVE\ YEARS\ OF\ RED\ WING\ COLLECTING}}$

25 years of RWCS Commemoratives.

On July 9, 1977, my wife, Pauline, and I attended the first Red Wing Collectors Society Convention at the Goodhue County Historical Society. About 300 folks were there from seven different states. Lyndon Viel was autographing his first book, "Clay Giants," out on the lawn. I was overwhelmed to see that many people interested in Red Wing stoneware. In the four years that I had been collecting up to that point, I had watched it grow from only 3-4 people collecting it to now hundreds, complete with a newsletter, a Society, and now the first Convention. I thought I had died and gone to heaven - and it was crowded!

My commitment to collecting was based on the love and the history of Red Wing AND the prayer that, hopefully, someday I could get my money back. During that day I had a chance to talk to a lot of people, see a lot of different pieces, and hear stories about a lot of pieces. I do not know of ANY piece that was SOLD that day. Items were eventually given away, or traded to fellow collectors, but no money exchanged hands that I know of. One of my better trades early on, I thought, was a sponge band salt box for a one gallon Albany bail handled Minnesota jug that I needed for my collection. How times have changed!


If you have not decided yet to make the trek to Red Wing this July, you should. Be a part of the 25th Anniversary experience with the rest of your Collectors Society friends!

### Romany pottery MARILYN & TERRY MOE

Jim Norine discovered the advertisement that is pictured with this article and discussed it at the recent RWCS MidWinter GetTogether. The items shown in the ad are a mixture of Gypsy Trail Plain and Reed, and include two items we have not seen pictured in the literature. The ad is not dated but the mention of war requirements would indicate a time period after December 1941. We are estimating the date to be in the first half of 1942 because all of the previously known items that are shown in the ad appear in the Red Wing Price Lists for January of 1942. Several items are missing in the June 15, 1942 Price List and do not reappear in later price lists. The


flip side of the ad features women's clothing, so it was part of a coupon book. Nothing more is known about the origin of the ad or about the types of coupons it was with.

The two most interesting items pictured are the 8" Vegetable Dish and the Cereal, Soup or Salad Bowl. The typical Reed Vegetable Dish was available in 8", 81/2", and 9" but had tab handles. This one is round with no handles. We have one like this in our personal collection but have not been able to verify that it is Red Wing until now. The Cereal, Soup, or Salad Bowl is a bit more difficult to positively identify from the picture. It does not have the tab handles typical of the Reed Cereal Bowl, so

that rules it out. It may be a 5" or 6" Reed Mixing Bowl, but we think it is not tall enough. We believe it is the 6" Reed Salad Bowl that is listed in the January 1942 price list.

The colors shown are traditional Gypsy Trail colors but have adjectives added to pique the interest of the customers. Orange was Flame Orange, Turquoise was Robin's Egg Blue, Yellow was Sunflower Yellow, and Royal Blue was Midnight Blue. Evidently the wartime requirement for uranium, which was used in creating some of the glaze colors, (particularly orange), was a factor as the color substitution disclaimer shows.

The ad raises a number of interesting questions about alternative distribution channels used by Red Wing to market

Ron Lindes' Display of Hand Painted Red Wing Dinnerware, People's Choice Award, 1995.




## $P_{ exttt{OTTERY}}$ X-FILES - QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

*Q* I have a pair of Red Wing pottery urns and wonder what you can tell me about them or their value?

R. Atkinson, Maryland

A These 10.5 inch urns were first produced by Red Wing Potteries in 1941 as part of their Magnolia line. These are unusual because they are hand-painted. I would guess that they are worth about \$225 each because of the intact lids and the hand painting. (R. Linde)



Q These items used to be my Grandmothers. The platter is in excellent condition and the marking on the back says, "Red Wing Pottery, Hand Painted." I would like to know when the piece was made and any other information about them.

D. Schuh, Wisconsin

A The piece is a 14" Brittany chop/platter. It is from the Provincial dinnerware line. One of 4 patterns named after 4 Provinces in France. Orleans, Ardenns, Britanny and the most famous Province of all, because of WWII,


Normanday. It is part of a full dinnerware set including all plates and pieces. The back ring, or foot, looks to be 1/4 of an inch in height or the high footed plate in the later issue the foot is much lower. The dinnerware was produced in the late teens and early 20's in the high foot style with a blue/black stamp. It was reissued in the 40's with the low foot and a red ink stamp. There seems to be some disagreement on the exact year but no doubt about the two different times. It's value if in mint condition is about \$75.00. There is lots of it around but many pieces are crazed. (C. Ekdahl) 4

A This 15 gallon salt glaze crock with 2 cobalt leaves has everything going for it! It is in mint condition, a nice glaze, 2 huge cobalt decorated leaves, and a beautiful front stamp Minnesota Stoneware Company. Truly a rare find indeed! Value \$1,800 - \$2,500? (D. Hallstrom/L. Peterson)





Everyone believed back then that there was an abundance of stoneware for everybody. Everyone was happy when someone else found a new piece. As the society grew and through auctions, the value of Red Wing steadily increased. Very few other collectibles or antiques in the last 25 years have gone up in value as much as Red Wing. Today, Red Wing is a highly sought after collectible which can be used as an investment opportunity for the future. When the stock market has gone down, I have gained much security knowing that my Red Wing collection has held or gone up in price! Twenty-five years ago my prayer was simply to get some of that money back if I ever sold. What I never counted on was the love and enjoyment that I received from my Red Wing experience. I found that many other folks were having my same experience. As more people collected and shared their experiences, the Society and the collecting exploded to a place that I could have never dreamed. Today, I just met another couple that started collecting less than a year ago. Listening to their excitement and to their enthusiasm for the Convention this summer, I realized that the Red Wing experience is still happening. Some of the changes that I have observed are that in the beginning you found items in antique stores and at estate auctions. Today, we have Ebay, auctions of just Red Wing, the Convention sales and auctions, the MidWinter GetTogether, networking, and even a shop that specializes in just Red Wing right in the city of Red Wing, MN. Convention size grew



from 300 to now thousands. The Convention started as one afternoon, and now stretches over a week's time this year. People are getting together monthly in many states thanks to the ever-increasing number of Society chapters. One book started it all, and today over a dozen different books have been printed involving the stoneware, art pottery, and the dinnerware line. It is one of the country's largest collector's societies. A complete set of the commemoratives are valued in the \$8,000 range. I remember that in 1978 there were commemoratives left over that didn't sell. The early collectors did not specialize; they bought every piece that they could get their hands on and get into their car. Today, collectors seem to want to specialize, sometimes right from the beginning. Early collectors never sold anything. Today collectors are weeding out their collection so that they can up-grade and trade in order to continue acquiring the coveted pieces. All of these changes are the

results of good pieces that used to be in the \$100 range, but are now in the \$5,000 to \$25,000 price range.

One of the most exciting things going on in the RWCS today is the delightful addition of programs and activities for children. My personal dream for many years has been to have a free museum open seven days a week. Last year this dream came true. The formation of the non-profit Red Wing Collectors Society Foundation Museum, which is located on the second floor of the old Pottery building, is the realization of this dream. This museum allows collectors and the public alike to view the complete range of what Red Wing produced. As I look back on my thirty years of collecting, I only wished that I had bought more and sold less; but whoops, there might have gone my marriage! So much has

but whoops, there might have gone my marriage! So much has changed in the last twenty-five years, but the excitement of collecting, and the joy of having it and seeing it always grows for me. I wish you the same.
