

STONEWARE MARK SHROUDED IN MYSTERY

This article is about stoneware that bears a distinctive cobalt decoration. The picture of the crock, jug, churn and preserve jar show the volume size (3 gallons) with lines on either side of a dot below the number. It is the design below the numeral that is so unique. (see photos)

Foremost among the speculators about the design was Lyndon C. Viel, one of the founders of the Red Wing Collectors Society and the author of The Clay Giants, The Stoneware of Red Wing, Goodhue County, Minnesota.

On page 65 of his book 2 and page 98 of book 3, Viel shared his experience of finally concluding that the design was initials. The large "S" would be a family or last name and the smaller "A" could be a first name. From Red Wing city directories he found a potter named August Sandberg employed by the Minnesota Stoneware Co. in 1894.

I had the pleasure of discussing these pieces with the Rev. Viel at a Red Wing Collectors Convention, and he agreed that they were not Red Wing products even though they shared some of the same general characteristics. We agreed that August Sandberg could have possibly been involved with the design since it was common for these potters to move from one pottery to another. There was no evidence, however, to indicate that the SA designation was anything more than pure speculation.

Other collectors see other possibilities in the design. Some see the letter "K." Some wonder about the upper part of the S with the small circle inside it possibly being the abbreviation for the word

"company." We all wonder about the significance of the line that is shaped like a shepherd's staff or crook.

We welcome additional speculation from everyone and would be thrilled if someone could inform us of the original meaning of the design.

The picture of the three jugs points out three different variations of the design. The design in the middle is the one found most frequently on various pieces. The one on the right appears to be the most primitive and is highlighted by the pointed top of the staff. Also, it has a rarely been seen without the lines and dot between the number and the design. The design on the jug on the left is distinguished from the other two by its larger "S" with small circle placed near the side of the upper part. This variation has been seen on only three pieces; the jug, a 6 gallon crock and a 4 gallon churn. Do these three variations imply that

there were three different potters decorating the pieces or are they the evolving skills of one person?

When and where were these pieces made? Prior to the Civil War many stoneware pieces were ovoid shaped. The straight sides, rims and formed tops all evolved from equipment and manufacturing advances developed after the war. The white or Bristol glaze was introduced just before the turn of the century and that improvement generally did away with the old salt glaze for commercial use. Most knowledgeable stoneware collectors would probably agree that these pieces were made during the last half of the 19th century. But where? All we can share is that most of

them have been seen in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin. Most of our pieces were found at farm and small town auctions and local flea markets in north central Ohio. Whenever possible I would ask the previous owners where the pieces had been made. No one knew.

We are aware of the following sizes and types of containers. The types of containers are shown in the picture of the 3 gallon pieces. Our collection contains 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 8 gallon crocks; 3 and 4 gallon jugs; 3, 4, 5 and 6 gallon churns and the 3 gallon preserve jar. We have been told that someone else had heard of a water cooler but we have no confirmation. We would appreciate learning about any other sizes and types of containers out there.

There are two other characteristics that should be shared. The one that

is common with the stoneware of other potters is the one or two scribe lines around the crocks and churns that are close to the attached handles. The uncommon characteristic is that the crocks are made with a wider bottom so that a 2 gallon crock will stack nicely on top of a 3, the 3 on top of a 4, all the way through the 8 gallon crocks. Some variation have been found. Several summers ago at a Red Wing Collectors Society Convention, Dick Marshall, a collector from Indiana, shared a crock with a cobalt D.A.B. under the design. I want to thank Jack May of Broomfield, Colorado, for sharing his jug with the flagtrue folk art- and Mike Race of Chisholm, Minnesota, for sharing his jug with the target, or bee stinger, added to the bottom. Are there other oddities out there? Please help expand our knowledge

of this uniquely decorated stoneware by sharing with us what you know or can learn from the elders in your community. Are there other forms or sizes than what we have? Where were they made? When were they made? When were they made? Who made them? August Sandberg is a long shot but until we know more, we'll use his initials. What more can we learn about the "SA" stoneware?






Thursday auction (that's if you have the high bid).


${\mathcal P}$ OTTERY X-FILES - QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

I have an 8 gallon crock that we would like some information about. I have had it since 1970. My father-in-law gave it to me and he was a "native" of Red Wing. He told me this crock had been in his family for years. At the time he found it, it was laying on its side in his cellar. He was thrilled that I had an interest in it and then he gave it to me!

What a great story! This 8 gallon birch leaf butter churn was produced by the Union Stoneware Company in the early 1900s. The "8" gallon size butter churns are extremely scarce and hard to find. If it had the original lid, it would be even more valuable. The way is it now, the value could be between \$1,800-2,000.

Please help me with the age and value of my 30 gallon Red Wing crock. It is 25" high, 21" across, the wing is 5", with the blue oval stamp. It has a heavy rim around the top.

The approximate time your 30 gallon crock was produced was 1915 and the estimated value could be \$350-450.


\mathcal{H} OLY CROCK!




