


Q I would like to know the current value of a three piece set, teapot w/lid #261, creamer #263 and sugar #262. The style is similar to Magnolia artware.

SUE TAGHAPIETRA: This is a pretty set! I cannot find a name for this pattern and only see it referenced in two early Red Wing books. The teapot is pictured in Lyndon Viel's Clay Giants, Book 3, page 190 captioned "teapot is a design modification from other sets changed to become art pottery." The sugar and creamer are pictured on page 25 (and valued at \$23 for the pair) in Red Wing Pottery with RumRill by Delores Simon (1982). The color and glaze shown is different from the Magnolia line and more closely resembles early RumRill pieces. The set is scarce, and should retail for about \$150.

MONNA ERICKSON: I agree that the set does not turn up often. I'd value the teapot at \$100, and the sugar and creamer at \$80.



Q We purchased this 5-gal water cooler in June, 1995 at a Kentucky flea market for \$100. It appears to be Red Wing, but is not marked, although it is marked on the inside bottom with a "5." Is this Red Wing, and is it common?

LARRY PRIMESON: This is definitely a Red Wing hand-turned water cooler. They are extremely rare without the wing and oval. However, in general, such coolers are not as desirable as the wing and oval water cooler and are therefore priced a lot less. Still this is worth more than the \$100 you paid. I'd put it in the \$300-\$350 range.

Q I recently found a solicitation letter in some copies of The Glaze that I bought at auction last year in New Germany, MN for \$10. The letter is from Dave Newkirk and informs Glaze readers that "it is my intention to start an organization and to publish a newsletter for collectors of stoneware and pottery made at Red Wing, Minnesota." Does this letter have any historic value, or is it just an old nostalgic letter for me to enjoy?

NICOL KNAPPEN: Helping Larry Roschen compile the RWCS 20th Anniversary book I've seen a lot of early memorabilia, but not this letter—it's a fascinating document. Although *The Glaze* had less than 1,000 subscribers, I'd bet that

most retained their copies and all collateral materials, so almost certainly there are other copies of this letter extant. This letter would be an excellent candidate for either the "Memorabilia" category newly inaugurated by the Display committee or maybe even the RWCS Historic Timeline Display. We would like some belp in finding out if this water cooler was a converted canning jar or if it was originaly made as a cooler. It is in very good shape except for missing lid closure

wire. Any idea of value?

LARRY PETERSON Check to see if the hole is glazed on the inside. Sometimes people have drilled them and made the ball-lok jar into a cooler. It is not common to find one factory made (with the hole glazed). If hole is glazed, value it at \$275—\$325; if not, \$125–175.



Q I recently found this 3-lb pantry jar at a street fair. No lid and two tiny chips on back bottom rim. Should I have the chips repaired or leave them alone. What would the value of the piece be?

LARRY PETERSON Your 3-lb pantry jar with base chips will probably be worth more *not* repaired. Most collectors would prefer to buy *unrepaired* pieces. In this condition, without lid, I'd price it at \$325–\$375.

President Olson called the meeting to order at 1:05 pm. Agenda items were moved to accommodate presenters wishing to address the BOD. Chapter reports, East and West Repreports and Newsletter reports were added to the agenda. The secretary regrets the error. Larry Roschen asked to change "expenses" to "receipts" in his report of the minutes of October, 1996. Moved by Jerry Flicek, seconded by Ruby Benson to approve minutes as amended by Larry Roschen. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT Jerry Flicek reported with a preliminary report of 1996 (see table, page 7). Moved by John Key, seconded by Mary Osterholz to approve Treasurer's report. Motion carried. Discussion followed on authorization for temporary loans. Before commemorative monies arrive in order not to cash in CDS. Moved by Jeff Floyd, seconded by Diane Hallstrom, that authorization of temporary loans requires the Treasurer and three other officers-one of whom must be the President or Vice-President-signatures' to a limit of \$20,000 temporary borrowing, Motion carried, John Key asked the minutes to reflect the hard work and dedication that Jerry Flicek puts forth and has done this past year.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT Corrinne Reed reported on her work on the historical timeline for the 20th anniversary. She presented a loan agreement for RWCS members loaning items for the display. The display will be set up Monday, July 7 and open from July 8–11, 1997. Discussion. (Sue Gilmer arrived at this point of the meeting).

COMMITTEE REPORTS

EDUCATION Sandy Short has contacted a speaker for the Convention's general session. Ten seminar speakers are already confirmed. Discussion followed on how to improve the quality of the videotapes made of the seminars.

DISPLAYS Ruby Benson reported displays will be upstairs from last year's location. Five displays, plus chapter displays and rare items displays are confirmed.

PUBLICITY Sue Gilmer reported on a new letter to contact advertisers for the supplement. The *Republican Eagle* predicts a 15% increase on paper costs. 11,700 supplements were printed in 1996. Sue requested updated biographies and pictures of BOD members for the supplement.

COMMEMORATIVE Larry Roschen has 600 coffee mugs ready for MidWinter Get'logether. Every 1997 commemorative will be accompanied by a booklet detailing twenty years of commemoratives. Moved by Larry Roschen, seconded by Wally Armstrong, to print 10,000 booklets and sell the extras. Motion carried. Moved by Paulette Floyd, seconded by Diane Hallstrom that Larry Roschen thank the producer of the special anniversary stoneware piece given to RWCS for our 20th anniversary. Motion carried.

AUCTION Floyds reported on the 12% commission. The \$10 minimum commission charge improved the quality of the auction in 1996. The minimum commission charge for 1997 is \$12 or 12%. This year there will be two teams of graders.

MEMBERSHIP John Key reported that approximately 6,200 Newsletters are being sent out with each issue. He discussed the computer upgrade for membership. He was allotted up to \$800 in October to upgrade. The bids came in slightly over that so he presented the choices to the BOD with his recommendations. Diane Hallstrom reminded the BOD that when the managerial position is in place RWCS will have to supply that individual with a new computer to manage all the

areas required. Key said he could maintain the status quo until that time. Nancy Reed, gopher chapter, suggested a subcommittee to draw on general membership expertise to get RWCS more efficient on computers. John will develop his committee's needs with the package of information regarding the job description of the manager and report in April 1997. John presented a triplicate form to be used at Convention for new and renewal memberships to facilitate shorter lines. He encourages all members to renew before Convention.

Convention 266 members preregistered for MidWinter GetTogether. Twenty additional sweatshirts are available for sale. Room sales are tonight, Sandy Short reported on Saturday's seminars.

CHAPTER REPORTS Mike Zaeske reported the Michigan chapter was not too active. Nothing to report from Gopher chapter.

EAST REP Mary Osterholz, no report. West Rep Wally Armstrong reported three chapters in his area have requested financial reports. Barney recommended members attend the general business meeting in July when the Treasurer presents the annual report. In the future a balance sheet and preliminary reports will be included in the minutes and published in the Newsletter. Discussion followed regarding proposals for a RWCS internet site. Byron Bush, Nicol Knappen and Steve Brown all submitted proposals. Bush and Knappen were here to make presentations. Discussion. Moved by Corrinne Reed, seconded by Paulette Floyd to budget \$500 to establish a web page for RWCS, with Board committee of Corrinne Reed, Sue Gilmer, Jeff Floyd and Nicol Knappen to oversee Byron Bush to create, maintain and follow access and usage until July Convention. And further to register RWCS and Red Wing Collectors

Society as internet addresses. Discussion, 8 nays, 3 ayes, 2 abstentions. Motion defeated. Pres. Olson appointed Sue Gilmer, Corrinne Reed, Jeff Floyd and Nicol Knappen to serve as an Internet subcommittee. Moved by John Key, seconded by Larry Roschen for sub-committee to prepare a proposal for April 97 BOD meeting for the formation and implementation for a RWCS web site. Discussion. Motion carried. Adjourned at 5:20 pm.

Pres. Olson reconvened the BOD meeting at 8:05 am Sunday, 2/23/97. The newly appointed Internet subcommittee met and Corrinne Reed reported that RWCS should try to work with the University of Minnesota as our server. Sue Gilmer will pursue that option.

SUB-COMMITTEE REPORTS 20th Anniversary Committee Diane Hallstrom reported the subcommittee has been meeting monthly to prepare plans for Convention events. Traditional Convention events such as auction, education day and show and sale will occur as usual. Many other events in and around Red Wing will begin as early as Sunday, July 6, 1997. That week will be proclaimed RWCS Week by the mayor of Red Wing, Sunday, July 6 the Downtown Council is sponsoring an antique show. Banners will be hung from light poles around downtown and are available to individual and chapters for \$100 each. They will hang downtown the entire week. Charter members and BOD members past and present will receive recognition. A budget for the 20th anniversary will be finalized and approved at the April '97 BOD meeting. The budget will include advertising and marketing the 20th anniversary. A professional videotaping of the entire weeks' events for historical purposes will be made. Security for the Convention was discussed. Hallstroms were not satisfied with the security company in 1996. The company for 1997 is \$15.40 an hour per individual security guard. This is up 90 cents an hour from 1996. We will use approximately 275 hours of security in 1997, for displays, auction and show and sale et. al. Moved by Sandy Short, seconded by John Key

to hire Twin Cities Security for the 1997 Convention at the rate of \$15.40 an hour per guard. Motion carried. Dave Hallstrom presented an advertising proposal to place ads for RWCS in a variety of trade journals. Moved by Rich Cronemeyer, seconded by Ruby Benson, to use \$2,000 for advertising in the Antique Trader, Old Times, Collectors' Journal and Yesteryear. Motion carried. Button design and chapter selection to produce the 20th anniversary button will be done by the 20th anniversary committee and presented to the BOD in April.

OLD BUSINESS

Fee Increases Pres. Olson reported limited feedback on the fee increases regarding Convention, auction percentage and 20th anniversary commemorative. All the committees involved in these increases explained the rationale in their reports printed in the Newsletter. RWCS subsidized the 1996 Convention by over \$17,000. The Red Wing High School contracts with RWCS for the use of the High School charges \$7,000. This is up from the fee charged by the Technical College. The facility is larger, newer and better for our Convention. A major reason for the increase is to offset the Convention costs. Insurance, security, duplicating, mementos, etc. all cost money. The lease for 1997 with the RW high school has yet to be finalized. Diane will follow up on this.

As you can see from the preceding pages, there is a lot going on this year at the Convention. Activities have been expanded beyond the usual Wednesday to Sat-

urday. We'll have activities from Sunday to Sunday this year, in celebration of the RWCS's 20th Anniversary.

Please remember to send in your Auction Registration Cards as soon as possible. All forms must be postmarked by May 1, 1997. Shortly after we will hold the lottery to

determine which pieces will be in the Convention Auction. We will send out postcards in the middle of May to notify members whether or not they are in the Auction. 

MEMBERSHIP RESTRUCTURING In October the BOD discussed the option of a fee structure and an annual renewal date. After discussion with the Treasurer and the Membership chair, both recommended against changing the status quo. Moved by John Key, seconded by Diane Hallstrom to pay for duplicating and mailing for approximately 2,500 expired members to invite them back to the RWCS membership before the 20th anniversary Convention. Discussion. Motion carried.

NEWKIRK OVERRUNS In October former Newsletter publisher Dave Newkirk requested \$1 apiece for 1,734 newsletters (with approximately 1,200 in envelopes). Pres. Olson reported one member used the 800 number to request the BOD not to pay Newkirk. Moved by Diane Hallstrom, seconded

by Corrinne Reed, to pay Newkirk up to \$1.734 for the overruns of Newsletters from 1993, '94 and '95 and VP Rich Cronemeyer, Newsletter liaison, will meet with Newkirk to negotiate the amount the BOD will pay, 12 ayes, 1 may 1 abstention, Motion carried. BOARD POSITION FOR MIDWINTER GET-Togmer 1997 attendance was approximately 500. Olson recommended to the BOD that RWCS needs someone other than the Convention committee chairs to be in charge of the MidWinter GetTogether. Diane Hallstrom suggested we continue to see how it grows and go to the membership when committee chairs are up for re-election in 2000. It is too much responsibility for one committee as it grows each year. We will continue to place this item on the agenda.

Managerial Position of RWCS Pres. Olson reported that six individuals have requested the packet with the job description. None of these six have

> returned a resume. We have only advertised it once in the Newsletter. We will run the ad again. Discussion followed on how to best advertise the position. The BOD suggested Pres. Olson expand the search by placing ads in Midwest regional newspapers.

OFFICE SPACE FOR RWCS Pottery Place has contacted Olson re: a space in their building for our Manager/office. John Key reported he has spoken to the new manager of the Potteries. The location is on the third level, RWCS will stay in con-

tact with the Potteries and once we have a manager we will secure a location.

NEBRASKA CHAPTER Pres. Olson will contact the president of the Nebraska chapter. Nebraska requested recognition. Chapter recognition is approved by the general membership at the annual business meeting. Olson suggests the chapter may operate as he sees no difficulty with approval in July.

Newsletter Nicol Knappen reported the BOD funded \$300 to process the forms to go from first class mailing to periodical rate. He presented this to the BOD and the general membership in July. Periodical rate is handled exactly like First Class by the post Office and carriers. A periodical rate will provide substantial savings for RWCS, from 52 cents a newsletter to approximately 28 cents and the weight allowance has some variance. Content will not be decreased and advertising can be increased. Knappen cannot opt to use periodical rate without a change in his contract. Discussion. Moved by Larry Roschen, seconded by Jeff Floyd to amend the Newsletter contract per paragraph 18 for paragraph 9 of the contract to read: "first class mail or periodical rate at the option of the publisher" shall be utilized by the publisher for the duration of this contract. Motion carried. Discussion on the RWCS logo. Knappen noted that the logo cannot reproduce accurately in one color, limiting its use for advertising. This is an ongoing discussion. Discussion followed about the Newsletter contract which expires on 12/31/97. Pres. Olson appointed Rich Cronemeyer and Corrinne Reed to meet with Knappen to negotiate an extension on his contract and present it at the April BOD meeting.

Moved by Ruby Benson, seconded by Wally Armstrong for the treasurer to pay all bills for the BOD and the MidWinter seminar. Motion Carried. Adjourned at 11:30 am.
