FRONT Ah, the theatrical life . . . in Red Wing! RWCS member Patty Van Gundy shares these old post cards showing

my grandfather and other gentlemen I can't identify. Apparently they were in a play, and I thought it was interesting to see the Red Wing bechive used as a prop. My grandfather was born in 1894; I'm guessing this could have been taken some time around 1914. Unfortunately, as with many old pictures, the identities and circumstances of the picture are lost. One can only guess!

Well, perhaps someone remembers, or has a RWHS yearbook that would explain these photos. Perhaps someone even saw the plays! Let's see-if you were, say, 10 years old in 1914, that would make you, uh, 94. Now that I think of it, not very likely, huh? BACK A hard-to-find "dealer's sign" advertising Red Wing Art Pottery. The glaze is the same as that used in the Magnolia line. It measures 71/2" wide by 6" high. Craig Rang, the second owner, sent us this photo. He picked this piece up at an estate auction in Baker, Montana last year. The first owner had bought the sign at a closing auction of a dime store in Beach, ND some twenty years previous. She purchased it along with a Rosemeade dealer's sign that this dime store used. It was either a Woolworth or a Coastto-Coast, Craig couldn't recall which. Maybe someone in Beach, ND remembers this store—maybe even this sign!

Our work on the 1998 commemorative project nearly complete, and we are already looking ahead to 1999. We still have a few

prepaid commemoratives ordered by members but not picked up at the Convention. If you are one of these members, please send the \$7 shipping charge to the Commemorative Committee address listed on page 2 of this Newsletter. Also, there are a few people who ordered mailed commemoratives but have memberships that expired before the Convention. Your commemoratives are being held until membership dues have been paid. If you have questions about your membership status please contact the Membership Committee.

A total of 6,522 prepaid 1998 commemorative orders were received. Of that number, 2,738 were mailed commemoratives and the remainder were to be picked up at the Convention. Nearly 75 were not picked up and have been (or will be) mailed. Commemorative sales at the Convention were 1,042. The grand total of commemoratives sold in 1998, therefore, was 7,564.

We continue to hear positive comments about the blue Iris pitcher that serves as this year's Convention commemorative. Thanks to all who took the time to let us know that they appreciate our efforts. That's what makes it all worthwhile for us. We selected the Iris pitcher because it fills a niche in the commemorative collection. The Red Wing potteries made pitchers in dozens of varieties;

I find that mail from and about Red Wing is always interesting when it comes across my desk. Some recent communications need to be shared with you. Here's one from Don Davisson of Fort Pierre, SD:

We bought a piece of *Muse* from an ad in a recent *Newsletter*. The piece was advertised as in mint condition. When the piece arrived, in my opinion, it was not mint. We spoke with the seller on the phone. He was very reluctant to discuss returning my money, even though I expressed my reasons for asking for my money back. He said he would think about it. In the meantime, I sent a letter voicing my concern. He then wrote and said he would return my money. His letter was quite rude.

I do not know the position of the RWCS on disagreements over classifieds. Perhaps this subject should be addressed by the *Newsletter* Advisors board, or the Board of Directors. It seems to me that there should be a buyer satisfaction agreement made by the seller. Also, if an advertiser has complaints registered, should be be allowed to continue to list pieces for sale in the *Newsletter?* 

We collect for fun and enjoyment and this transaction has soured us on buying anything from ads, sight unseen. I don't think "buyer beware" applies here as we expect that if an article was in the *Newsletter*, the seller was reputable. This is the first complaint I've had about an advertiser during my tenure, but I would assume it's happened before in RWCS's history. Future issues will include some sort of disclaimer at the top of the classifieds page warning buyers that it might be prudent to ask for right of return before sending off a check. As to an official policy, Newsletter Advisors and BOD members are hereby put on notice that this is possibly an issue to be dealt with.

It's been my experience that unless you insist on the right or return for any reason whatsoever, there's always the possibility that you'll be stung. The RWCS and the Newsletter can make some rules, but if you've been swindled out of, say, \$400, does knowing that the perpetrator will be ejected from the RWCS make up for that?

Of course this isn't an issue just with Red Wing. I recently had an experience on Ebay, the internet auction service, that taught me a lesson. A scarce piece of pottery was offered for sale, and the detailed description included warning of a tiny base chip. I took the seller at his word, but neglected to ask for a measurement of the damaged area. In my opinion, a <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>" base chip on a 8" vase is not tiny, but I could see where a non-pottery dealer would think it was inconsequential. Similarly, it never occured

to ask me if there were prominent mold marks, which there were. I chalked this experience up as a lesson and use the vase as a constant reminder when contemplating future deals. When I sold some things on Ebay recently, I noted that most Ebay buyers were a lot more savvy than I had been. One fellow responded with a list of 11 questions about my listing of a Rookwood bowl. I was flabbergasted, and not a little annoyed, but responded. P.S., the bowl sold to the same guy, who was delighted. . . .

Although buyers can ask for right of return, that doesn't mean that sellers have to give it, or give it with carte blanche. Sellers should be aware of a scam that is occasionally pulled. Let's use Roseville as an example. Say a fellow has a piece of Cherry Blossom that would normally retail for about \$900, but it has a tight, hard-to-see hairline. He waits to find a similar piece in mint condition advertised somewhere, then buys it. After it arrives, he claims it has a tight, hard-to-see hairline, and returns his original defective piece. If the glaze color and mold quality are similar enough, a seller will have a hard time proving that the defective piece is not the one that was sent off. This is why you'll often see people saying that their items can be returned as long as the original label






# Spittoons & Cuspidors



The top two are from a Red Wing Stoneware Company catalog dated 1894 pages 21 and 23), and the bottom four photos show pages 10 through 13 of a Red Wing Union Stoneware Company catalog that was probably printed sometime between 1906 and 1910. 





In case some younger readers might not understand what on earth these things were used for, we quote the Oxford English Dictionary's definition of a spittoon:


A receptacle for spittle; usually a round flat vessel of earthenware or metal, sometimes having a cover in the form of a shallow funnel with an opening in the middle, and frequently containing sawdust.

Now, what's the difference between a cuspidor and a spittoon? Despite the distinction made in production catalogs, dictionaries consider them the same thing. Spittoon is the newer word, first print usage shown as about 1823, and it's English. Cuspidor is American, and comes from the Portuguese word *cuspidouro* [place for spitting], first usage shown is 1735.

Does that mean cuspidors are an American invention? It would make sense, what with tobacco being almost as American as apple pie. . . .

# Questions Answers


Need help identifying something? Or is there something about Red Wing that you've always wanted to know but didn't know who to ask? Here's your chance—and you may win a Special Commemorative for your efforts. Good 35mm photos help, but Polaroids are better than nothing. If you want your photos returned, enclose a SASE. Allow a generous amount of time for your answer to appear.



**Q** We have a 2-gal large wing crock on which the wing and oval are switched, with the oval being in the middle and the wing on the bottom. We were curious as to whether or not this was considered an oddity or if it was fairly common. If it is considered an oddity, about how much would it raise the value over a standard 2-gal crock?


DAVE KUFFEL. An unusual artwork variation does draw interest. This variation is uncommon, but surfaces regularly. There are collectors who collect "different" 2-gal crocks and collectors who like unusual artwork (upside down oval, double strikes, wrong colors, etc., regardless of the size of crock, or jug churn or cooler. I'd place the value of this crock between \$75 and \$95.



**Q** I recently bought a 3-gal jug. I thought it was different because of the lack of total glazing on the red wing. It must have got by any inspection they had or was sold as a second. Would a jug like this have less or more value because of its flaws?

—Wayne Engels, Watertown, WI GARY & BONNE TEFFT. The condition of the glaze on your jug is known as "crawling." It occurs because something on the surface of the piece caused the glaze slip to not adhere and to "pull away" in an area during firing instead of fusing uniformly over the surface. While it does add a certain amount of interest or conversational value to the jug, we don't imagine that it enhances its value.

**Q** In my travels across western Utab, I asked "any Red Wing around bere?" I was directed to a garage out in the countryside and purchased a 20-gal and 15-gal crock. Each bad two spigots, and the glazing in the boles indicated that they came this way from the factory. I was given the story that they were "syrup crocks," and the very top layer of the refined crystallized liquid was drawn off as a premium syrup. Made a good story! What do the experts say? And, are



these crocks unusual or of greater value?


—Byron Roderick, Bloomfield, CO DAVE KUFFEL. I think crystallized sugar would be pretty hard to draw through a faucet. . . . I have seen this faucet/spigot configuration only on larger crocks, typically 12-gal and up. It is my understanding that these types of jars were used to mix and package chemicals in a manufacturing process. The top "inlet" was to fill the jar with a fluid (water, thinner, etc.), add in the other parts (powder, pigments, pastes), and mix in crock. Drain off or fill bottles or cans through bottom spigot.

While these crocks are uncommon, they are not highly sought after. Still, I would see this type of jar priced higher than a regular similar crock by 25% to 50%.


**Q** On page six of the Red Wing Stoneware book I see that the Red Wing Stoneware Company started in 1877. This 4-gal jug has 1877 incised behind the numeral 4 in 1<sup>1</sup>/2<sup>n</sup> tall numbers. Is it possible that I have a first-year piece of Red Wing?

GARY & BONNIE THEFT. The Red Wing Stoneware Company was incorporated on February 9, 1977, but the factory was not completed until the beginning of the following year. A February 6, 1878 article in the Red Wing Advance spoke of the company's opening of the "first batch of ware burned in its new kiln." Your piece demonstrates impor-



tant features to collectors hoping to attribute unsigned ware by shape, color or geometric decoration. These features were traditional of the stoneware industry and not often exclusive to any particular pottery.



**Q** We found this matt-orange bowl at an antique show. It is bottom-impressed Red Wing. What can you tell us about its value and scarcity?

—Jamey & Flo Jensen, Lone Rock, IA RON LINDE. What an unusual bowl! The deco styling, the impressed Red Wing mark and the orange glaze date the bowl in the mid- to late-1930s. This is a rare piece that I would value at \$100-\$125.




**Q** I'm boping that you can belp me identify these bowls. As you can see, they are blue glaze inside and out and are graduated from 5" to 9". The bottom marks reads only RED WING USA. Many RWCS members bave looked at them and know nothing about this set. If you have any history on them I would appreciate it, also an approximate value would be belpful. Thanks for your belp!

GARY & BONNIE TEFFT A similar style of bowl (without the notches on the


shoulder) was firstshown on the c. 1930 Red Wing Stoneware and Stoneware Specialties poster (see Red Wing Potters & Their Wares, pps. 158–159). Your style of bowl is shown in an undated (est. c. 1936–1947) Red Wing Potteries brochure under the name Colonial Shoulder Bowls (sizes 5", 6", 7", 8", 9", 10", and 12"). These catalogs show the bowls with blue bands or blue-and-red bands on the shoulder. For an all-blue bowl, signed Red Wing, we would estimate a minimum value of \$125. The 5" and 12" sizes would have the greatest value.



**Q** Can you identify these? I found the 5-gal salt glaze beebive in Nashville and the 2-gal salt glaze jug with advertising came from a dealer who bad purchased the jug at a farm auction outside of Topeka, Kansas:

GARY & BONNIE TEFFT Your 5-gal butterfly-decorated jug is most likely a Red Wing product. It was fired in a well-



used kiln that had built up a thick coating of salt glaze that dripped onto the ware from the interior surfaces. A value estimate would be somewhere in excess of \$1,500. The 2-gal is a rare example of an advertising liquor jug. It is not a Red Wing product.




