





${\mathcal E}$ SCAPE TO THE ISLANDS WITH TRADER VIC



Minnesotans traveling in California during the early 1960s doubtless would have been surprised to learn that when they ate that special dinner in San Francisco at Trader Vic's island cuisine restaurant, they were eating off plates and drinking out of mugs made in Red Wing, Minnesota.

Several pieces that were made for Trader Vic's are described and pictured in Ray Reiss' "Red Wing Art Pottery." Most are easily recognizable for their South Sea island appearance. In addition to shell plates, fish dishes and bamboo serving

Trader Vic's, a San Francisco restaurant that became an international chain, served island cuisine on Red Wing-made plates and bowls in the 1960s. Specialty drinks came in Red Wing Art Pottery mugs of different shapes.






pieces, Trader Vic's featured several unique mugs - among them coconut shells, African figures, Tikis and skulls, often marked Trader Vic's c 1963 U.S.A.

There's also a tall (8½ inch) vessel that was made specially for serving the Fog Cutter drink. It has painted figures in relief - dancing women and a lounging man - and usually has a tan fleck background. According to Reiss, this version also was made for a Chicago-based restaurant supply store, and may turn up with Edward Don & Company impressed on the bottom. If there's a white field and

a lot of painted detail, they may have been used as store displays. Another familiar Red Wing piece that isn't always associated with the restaurant is the small (6 inch) white butterfly ashtray. Some are marked Trader Vic's, while others were given as souvenirs to people who toured the factory, Reiss said.

Vic Bergeron's restaurant, established in 1934, eventually became a chain of Trader Vic's eateries located around the globe serving Polynesian inspired food and beverages. The name also appears today on a full line of food and beverage products including



exotic drink mixes and syrups, salad dressings, sauces and spices. Among Trader Vic's claims to fame

is his premier drink, which he first mixed in 1944 - the Mai Tai. Mixes said to recreate the taste are available now, but purists can find his original recipe on-line at Razzle Dazzle Recipes.

A summer party featuring island cuisine is the perfect way to use

Trader Vic's dishes and mugs. Many recipes featured over the years at Trader Vic's can be found on the Internet and in his cookbooks.

No Trader Vic's meal would be complete without a Fog Cutter, the drink traditionally served in the tall Red Wing Pottery mugs. Escape to the islands and enjoy!

TRADER VIC'S ORIGINAL MAI TAI

2 ounces 17-year-old J Wray Nephew Jamaican rum over shaved ice

½ ounce French Garnier orgeat (almond syrup)

½ ounce Holland DeKuyper orange curacao

¼ ounce Rock Candy Syrup (or Simple Syrup Lime)

Juice from one fresh lime

Shake vigorously; serve in a 15-ounce glass. May garnish with half of the lime shell inside the drink and float a sprig of fresh mint at the edge of the glass.

TRADER VIC'S FOG CUTTER

Put in a shaker with cracked ice:

1 oz. orange juice

2 oz. lemon juice

½ oz. orgeat syrup

2 oz. light rum

1 oz. brandy

½ oz. gin

Sherry float

Shake all ingredients except the Sherry Float and pour into a 14-oz. or larger glass/mug. Add ice to fill glass, then add sherry wine float. Serve with straws (and two aspirin).

The Pacific Island theme was evident in Trader Vic's serving pieces, including salt and pepper shakers.

Jerry Flicek was from New Prague, Minnesota and was RWCS member #393. Jerry was inducted into the RWCS Hall of Fame on July 7, 2000, in recognition of these lifetime achievements:

- Instrumental in governing the **RWCS**
- Treasurer RWCS 1983-2000
- · Member of the RWCS Vision Committee
- Instrumental in establishing the **RWCS** Foundation

Jerry, working with six RWCS presidents, managed the growth of the RWCS treasury from less than \$100 (handed to him in a paper

bag) to more than \$500,000 in annual revenues. His quiet leadership and dedication to the ideals of the RWCS have been an invaluable service to both the organization and its membership. Jerry Flicek's contributions were key to the consistent growth enjoyed by the RWCS.

As described by some of those who had the honor of working with Jerry, he was described as highly intelligent, had a great sense of humor and offered quiet counsel to others.

One of his trademark expressions was, "I will tell you where the money came from and where the money is going to go!"

Our condolences to Jerry's family and friends. His support of the RWCS has helped it become a better organization and grow. He will be missed by many people.

\mathcal{S} ELLING TIPS FROM BYRON


Byron Roderick has more fun relating to the annual RWCS Convention attendees than selling his Red Wing pieces.










































$R_{ t ED}$ wing collectors expand your horizon

Before the Red Wing Potteries, production of mid 19th century Eastern stoneware was very competitive. There were dozens of potteries throughout Vermont, New York and Pennsylvania along the canals and rivers to service the New America. To sell their wares to the exploding population, factory owners turned to artisans. Their imaginative cobalt blue decorators using the wet clay as their canvas, created works of art out of plain utilitarian forms. Each factory had distinctive styles and designs that

are highly sought after even now. Today, slip cobalt blue birds, florals, animals and geometric designs are now on display in the homes of admiring collectors, much as they were in the 19th century. The absentee American Pottery Auction catalog has catered to this audience by offering a variety of stoneware in our semi-annual sale. Participating bidders vie for approximately 300 items, ranging in price from \$50-\$50,000 for the opportunity to add to their collections.


