

NEW OFFICERS ELECTED TO RWCS BOARD



Paine-Williams Research Donated to RWCS FOUNDATION

The RWCS Foundation announced at Convention that it has acquired the research ▲ of former RWCS Member Anne Paine Williams, who died in March at the age of 77. Williams collected materials and performed research for a book on the Red Wing Potteries around the same time as Red Wing Potters & Their Wares authors Gary & Bonnie Tefft. When the Tefft's book came out, Williams decided to put her project on the back burner.

Williams' daughter, Sally Williams, decided to donate the materials to the Foundation after being contacted by Foundation President Dave Kuffel. The materials consist of taped interviews with former Red Wing Potteries workers, transcripts, photographs, catalogs, sales brochures and other information about the pottery industry.

RWCS Historian Steve Brown will organize a team of RWCS members to inventory and assess the multitude of information, and eventually materials will be shared with the membership.

ABOUT THE COVER

uring Convention Week in Red Wing, it's uncommon to find one of the best pieces for sale at an antique shop. But as anyone who stopped in at Al's Antiques on Plum Street can tell you, that wasn't the case this year.

This ½ gallon blue sponged crock sat among some much more common stoneware in a locked display case, but owner Al Novek was kind enough to pull it out for some photos. The incredible lunch hour folk art piece, which Al dates to the 1920s, boasts a self-portrait of Red Wing Stoneware employee Alfred Hempftling and is signed "A. Hempftling" on the bottom. Some Internet research revealed that Alfred is buried at St. John's Lutheran Cemetery in Red Wing. He was born in 1889 and died in 1965.

Al acquired the crock a few years ago when buying antiques from an elderly Red Wing lady.

"She showed me her stoneware, but it was all common stuff," he recalls. "I asked if she had anything else and she said she had a small crock in a box in the closet. When I opened it up, I couldn't believe my eyes - it looked brand new. She said she kept the crock hidden away in her closet all these years because Hempftling was her brother-in-law and she never liked him!"

In addition to the exceptional cobalt color, portions of the self-portrait are incised into the clay. Plus, the blue sponging extends about 3 to 4 inches down the inside the crock.

Al has enjoyed the crock in his personal collection since he purchased it, but he decided to put it in his shop this year. But with a price tag well into the five figures, it's not priced to sell, so he might be keeping it for awhile longer.









Wisconsin Chapter:

REACHES \$7,100

Wow, what a roller coaster year at the annual Thursday Night RWCS Auction. We had a great turnout for items submitted this year, with the addition of the second piece option. Most pieces were delivered on Wednesday, July 7, with the balance arriving Thursday morning. There were ZERO no shows this year, although a Goodhue Co. Cooperative butter crock got broken before it made it to the building. How sad! The Auction went off smoothly and ended in about 4½ hours.

The highlight of this year's sale was a 10 gal double-handled Birchleaf threshing jug, selling for \$7,100. Bidding was noticeably lighter this year, with many items selling lower than anticipated. Sales totals reflected this, with an end result of just under \$95,000 for the 300 items submitted. Last year, 245 items sold for approximately \$125,000.

We are all feeling the change in the economy in our daily lives. I personally made a career change from manufacturing to law enforcement in the last two years. Money is tight and many questions remain for the future. We will continue to make every effort for the RWCS Auction to live up to the high standards that we have come to expect and offer a sale where the buyer knows exactly what they are bidding on. I believe our graders are some of the BEST experts of Red Wing and deliver a complete and honest report to buyers before the sale. Where else can you find that? This year, we were the last of five auctions held during Convention week. All of them are fun to attend and add to the Convention experience, but as a former employer used to say, "Somebody is eating our lunch". I hope all members realize that the Thursday Night Auction is the member's auction, directly benefiting members and the Red Wing Collectors Society itself.

We will always strive to make this event the best it can be. Members' comments and concerns are always addressed and changes are made to reflect the need for positive change. I look forward to seeing you all in the coming year and wish you all "Happy Hunting" in all your collecting.

HOTEL® RESTAURANT CHINA

ver the past several years, we have found small quantities of plain white dinnerware items with smooth surfaces sometimes bottom marked with the green upright wing stamp that was introduced in the mid 1960s. We assumed that this was intended for restaurant use because the items were very heavy and similar to restaurant dishes made by other potteries. No documentation had been located describing this pattern. In fact, we knew very little about Red Wing's foray into the commercial business because we had only an undated brochure showing the well-known white or beige fleck Hotel or Restaurant China with a ribbed design somewhat similar to Gypsy Trail Reed. In addition, we did not have documentation for the custom china done for Diamond Iim's, Sheraton, Sweden House or Thunderbird.

While recently examining some of the dinnerwareoriented documents in the Hutchson Collection now owned by the Red Wing Collectors Society Foundation, we discovered information which greatly clarified the standard Hotel or Restaurant Line. There were actually two patterns in the line. The more familiar ribbed items were called Empire Shape and the plain items were called Regal Shape. Both shapes were available in White or Beige Fleck glaze. Empire was the original pattern and consisted of many more items than Regal. It is also much easier to find today. Unfortunately, the Regal brochure that we viewed was far removed from the original and was very difficult to read. Items listed were: three sizes of plates, a bouillon cup, a sauce or fruit bowl, a cereal or salad bowl and a coffee cup and saucer. Additionally, we found a 9-inch nappy that matched the other items including the green wing.

We also acquired an original Hotel or Restaurant China brochure showing only the Empire items mailed to Mabel's Café in Grand Marais, Minn. On the second page was an ink stamp message from W.C. Ness of Red Wing Potteries describing the availability of the product with colored bands in green, blue, maroon or yellow. We had seen examples of these items over the years, but had no documentation about their origin.

What does all this mean? For one thing, it means that items with a blue band are not automatically Sweden House, nor are items with a maroon band automatically Diamond Jim's. It also means that while banded items are less numerous than the plain items, they are only special order items and should be valued as such rather than as something experimental.

I would like to start out by reminding everyone that whether you picked up your stoneware pig Commemorative at Convention, bought a lottery piece or your piece is being mailed to you, you have the same chance of receiving Versions A, B or C.

I believe everyone now has a complete understanding of the three version concept. Due to the fact that some Version A pieces look similar in color to Version B pieces, I inserted cards with all the Version B Commemoratives. The card stock matches the info cards and they say "Version B 2010".

This year we produced and distributed 3,500 pieces. This compares to 3,600 pieces in 2009. We experienced a much smaller decline in

orders as compared to previous years when we saw up to a 10 percent decrease from year to year.

The silent auctions in the Commemorative room were a big hit. Prices realized: set of A, B and C, \$570; triple version, \$550; Maple City lunch hour piece, \$200; Special Commemorative, \$375; salt glazed pig, \$225; and the KidsView pigs, \$125 to \$200 each.

The Commemorative production process has been slower this year due to the warmer temperatures and higher humidity experienced in the Midwest before and after Convention. After casting a pig, the mold has to dry before casting another. On good days, we were able to use each mold twice. On warmer, more humid days, we were only able to use each mold once. This extended the mail order process three weeks longer than expected. We contacted all mail order recipients by e-mail or mail and explained this on the answering machine at the RWCS Business Office.

I have BIG, BIG plans for next year, our 35th anniversary of Convention. When the Commemorative is unveiled in July 2011, it will have been in preproduction and production for three years!

One final note: a Version C pig sold on eBay in July for \$711.26.
